GRIFFS BACK IN HABIT OF LOSING

Nationals Are Beaten in Final Game of Series by Chicago White Sox by 4 to 1.

Chicago, Ill., June 14.—That victory of yesterday was evidently just an accident and not a habit, for the Griffins today dropped back into their old stride again and submitted to a 4 to 1 trimming at the hands of the White Sox in the final game of the series.

Even Walter Johnson could not stem the tide of defeat, yet the blame should not entirely rest on Walter's shoulders, for the Nationals could not bunt hits at the proper time, although Griff's young men got as many safe blows off Jim Scott as did the Sox off Johnson.

Walter was wild and constantly in a hole. The inning which insured victory for the Rowland crowd brought to light the usual flock of Texas leaguers, which invariably spells defeat for Johnson when the big fellow or his club happen to be in the throes of a slump.

The Nationals uncorked one lively rally in the fifth when a shut-out was averted. Other opportunities to put over runs went by the boards because hits were not forthcoming.

Double Play Killings.

Double plays in the first and fourth innings acted as wet blankets on budding rallies and precluded rallies.

After Morgan had perished in the fifth Eddie Foster singled to center, Johnson shot a safe one to right. McBride doubled the ball dropping safe to field inside the right field foul line. Terry also popped up and moved up the other runners. Big Rippy Williams, pinch-hitting for Ainsmith, might have changed the whole complexion of the battle with a safe slam, but instead he dribbled the ball in front of the plate and Johnson was caught at home. Danny Moeller fanned for the final out.

McBride doubled to start the Nationals' eighth, but his pals could not help him score and even with two down in the ninth Morgan walked and Foster singled, but Johnson's best was a roller to Terry forcing Foster at second and ending the game.

Score One Tally.

While the Nationals' three hits in the fifth produced but one lone marker, the White Sox bunched the same number of blows in the fourth and chalked up a couple of runs. It was a crime to see these tallies splash over. Jackson opened the inning with a drooping pop fly to left field. Fishel fanned and Schalk to left field. Terry also popped up to the ball landing safely between McBride, Rondeau and Milan, out of everybody's reach. There were two strikes on Scott when he shut his eyes and poked the ball into right field, scoring Jackson and Terry.
