

Will Be Shown at Loew's for Remainder of Week.
The last line of marchers in the preparedness parade yesterday passed in front of the reviewing stand about 2:45 o'clock and just about four hours after that the local motion picture men had their films finished and ready for exhibition. One of the pictures was shown last night at Loew's Columbia and will be shown there every afternoon and evening for the remainder of the week.
The picture was clear, making it easy for every one to distinguish themselves or their friends. The films of Washington's parade will probably have more moving picture publicity than any other preparedness parade because of the distinction of personnel.

HONORS FOR S. D. C. STUDENTS.
Washington Youths Among Graduates at Lafayette College.
Easton, Pa., June 14.—The largest class in the history of the college was graduated from Lafayette today. The class numbers 117 and of this number, eight of the graduates were Washington boys. William A. Polard, Jr., of 1753 U street northwest, was graduated at the head of his class and received membership in the honorary society of Phi Beta Kappa. He received the degree C. E., and delivered the engineering oration at the commencement exercises today.
Another honor man in the Washington group is George N. Cohen, of 722 Fourth street northwest. He is a graduate of McKinley Manual Training School, and received today the degree of Civil Engineer. He too was

awarded membership in the Phi Beta Kappa Society. He delivered the scientific oration at the commencement exercises.
