

# THROUGH WATCHES RAISING OF FLAG

### Crowd at Monument Exercises Almost Equals Number Who Saw Parade.

This is the story of the flag-raising on the Monument Lot yesterday—a flag raising which bid fair, within fifteen minutes of the arrival of President Wilson, to become one of the mere incidents of the preparedness parade, but which later almost put the parade itself in the shade.

The Monument Lot celebration was staged by the chief clerks of the various government departments of the city, assisted by several District and government officers. Long before the program of events began, the parking about the base of the Monument was packed with a dense crowd.

Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo, with Mrs. McAdoo and a party; Secretary of State Lansing, Secretary of Commerce Taft, Secretary of the Interior Lane and Mrs. Lane, and others, heard the President, who was accompanied by Mrs. Wilson, make a straight-from-the-shoulder "American" speech.

### Flag Raised First.

The first number on the program was the raising of a great flag to the top of the Monument, while the Marine Band played the accompaniment to "America." Secretary Lansing presided.

### To Report Military Bill.

Chairman Hay, of the House Military Affairs Committee, was yesterday instructed to report the military appropriation bill with a recommendation that it be passed by the House without amendment. The action of the committee indicates a fear that the advocates of preparedness would be successful in making substantial changes in the measure.

### German Steamer Attacked.

London, June 14.—A dispatch from Copenhagen states that the German steamer *Hollandia* was attacked off Orgrund by either a British or a Russian submarine, but that she escaped into Swedish waters.

### Germany Denies Torpedoing.

Amsterdam, June 14.—The German admiralty in an official statement today denies that the Dutch steamer *Tubantia* was sunk by a German submarine.

### German Fleet Reported Seen.

Amsterdam, June 14.—A squadron of seven German warships, preceded by a Zeppelin airship, passed Frisian Islands, going west, on Tuesday night, it was reported today.

# MEXICAN BREAK FEARED HOURLY

### U. S. Prepared to Rush Entire Army to Border in Event of Clash.

The administration expects the Mexican situation to come to head at any moment, and has prepared for every possibility, a high government official declared last night.

These new developments became known yesterday.

Gen. Carranza has been made to understand that the United States has no intention of withdrawing its troops from Mexico within four months at least and that every additional soldier sent to the border is meant for service in Mexico.

Pressure from foreign countries, whose nationals have large interests in Mexico, may force the hand of this government soon. Foreign nationals in Mexico are compelled by decree to pay their employees in gold, but in all other transactions must use Carranza's depreciated currency.

Official reports say disastrous riots may break out at any time in most Mexican cities.

Officials assert that conditions in some parts of Mexico are worse than in the war-stricken countries of Europe.

# DISCUSS PLANS FOR CONFEDERATE REUNION

### All Southern Societies of the District of Columbia Pledge Support to Idea.

Plans for a large Confederate reunion for Washington in 1917 were discussed at a banquet given last night at the University Club in honor of Ernest G. Baldwin, of Roanoke, Va., commander-in-chief, Sons of the Confederate Veterans. The co-operation of all Southern societies in Washington was pledged in a round of after-dinner speeches. The spirit of preparedness featured the evening.

Senator Duncan U. Fletcher, of Florida, told of the work of the Southern Commercial Congress and as president pledged its support. Clarence J. Owens, managing director, Southern Commercial Congress, and past commander in chief, Sons of Confederate Veterans, was toastmaster. Capt. C. C. Calhoun, president of the Southern Society of Washington, spoke for that society, while H. Oden Lake, national commander, Army and Navy Union, assured the officers of that society's help.

# WILSON CHARGES PLOT TO DEBASE POLITICS

which the American nation will turn with a might and triumph of sentiment which will teach these gentlemen once for all that loyalty to this flag is the first test of tolerance in the United States.

"I have not come here this afternoon with the purpose of delivering you an elaborate address. It seems to me that the day is sufficiently eloquent already with the meaning which it should convey to us.

"But this is not a day of sentiment. Sentiment is a propulsive power, but it does not propel in the way that is serviceable to the nation, unless it have a definite purpose before it. This is not merely a day of sentiment. It is a day of purpose. It is an eloquent symbol of the unity of our history that upon this monument which commemorates the man who did most to establish the American Union, we should have hoisted those stars that have multiplied since his day.

"Apparently this nation is again and again, and again, to be tested, and always tested in the same way. The last supreme test that this nation went through was the test of the civil war. You know how deep that cut. And you know how that ended. While it seemed a time of terror, it has turned out a proof of the validity of our hope.

### Test is Applied Again.

"And yet again the test is applied, my fellow-countrymen. A new sort of division of feeling has sprung up amongst us. You know that we are derived in our citizenship from every nation in the world. It is not singular that sentiment should be disturbed by what is going on on the other side of the water, but while sentiment may be disturbed, loyalty ought not to be. I want to be scrupulously just in assessing the circumstances of this day, and I am sure that you wish with me to deal out with an even hand the praise and the blame of this day of test.

"That is the lesson that I have come to remind you of on this day—no sentiment. It runs into your daily life and conversation. Are you going yourselves individually and collectively to see to it that no man is tolerated who does not do honor to that flag? It is not a matter of force. It is not a matter, that to say, of physical force. It is a matter of a greater force than that which is physical. It is a matter of spiritual force. It is to be achieved as we think, as we purpose, as we believe, and when the world finally learns that America is indivisible, then the world will learn how truly and profoundly great and powerful America is.

"If you could have gone with me through the space of the last two years, and could have felt the subtle impact of intrigue and sedition, and have realized with me that those to whom you have entrusted authority are trustees not only of the country, but of the very spirit and purpose of the United States, you would realize with me the solemnity with which I look upon that sublime symbol of our unity and power.

"I took the liberty a few weeks ago to ask our fellow-citizens all over the United States to gather together in celebration of this day, the anniversary of the adoption of our present flag as the emblem of the nation. I had no legal right to declare it a holiday. I had no legal right to ask for the cessation of business, but when you read the papers tomorrow morning, I think you will see that authority was not necessary; that the people of the country were waiting for an opportunity to cease their ordinary business and gather together in united demonstration of their feeling as a nation."
