AUSTRIAN TRENCHES TAKEN BY ITALIANS. London, June 15.—The Italians resumed their activity on the Isonzo front yesterday, occupying Austrian trenches of Montefalcone and taking 48 prisoners, including 10 officers. The position was taken after severe fighting preceded by artillery preparation.

On the Trentino front the Austrians announce the capture of Monte Lemerle, on the Sette Comuni plateau, southeast of Asiago, against which Austrian attacks have been directed since June 10, when a full Austrian division made an assault which was repulsed by an Italian counter-attack. The Austrian war office says that 800 prisoners were taken when the mountain was captured.

ST. PATRICK'S GIVES OUTING. Parish Held Its Annual Excursion at Marshall Hall. Despite the rain yesterday, St. Patrick's parish annual outing was held at Marshall Hall under management of Rev. John M. McNamara. Races were run under direction of Judge M. M. 

WOULD KEEP U. S. OUT OF MEXICO

LOS ANGELES BIGGEST CITY.

Now Covers 337.92 Square Miles of Territory. Los Angeles, Cal., June 15.—The annexation of Westgate and Occidental to the municipality of Los Angeles, ratified by the voters at a recent election, makes Los Angeles the largest municipality in the United States in point of area. It now has a total of 337.92 square miles, crowding Greater New York, with an area of 247.5 square miles, into second place. Chicago is third, with 198, and Philadelphia fourth, with 128. Los Angeles has a population of 600,000.

Million Shells Fired at Verdun.

Paris, June 15.—A million heavy shells were expended by the Germans in the bombardment of Fort Vaux from the beginning of March to early June, says a semi-official statement.
