## Next Week's Amusements

**Belleco—"Peace and Quiet."**  
Silvio Hein will furnish an important event in local theatricals next week by giving the initial performance of "Peace and Quiet," a new three-act melodramatic farce by Edwin Milton Royle author of "The Squaw Man" and other successes at the Belleco Theater, commencing Monday evening, June 13, for a week's engagement.  
"Peace and Quiet" is a graphic drama of border life, telling a story of compelling interest with the element of suspense carried through the three swift-moving acts of love, laughter and thrill. The hero of the play is a romantic soldier of fortune who, finds himself entangled in the politics of the Mexican border. An excellent production has been provided and a competent cast of players carefully selected, which includes Adol. Belleco, Mabel Turner, Henry Mortimer, Edwin Mordant, George Backus, Gus C. **Poll—"The Belle of Richmond."**  
One of the most delightful Southern tales that ever found expression on the American stage is "The Belle of Richmond," a four-act comedy-drama, which will be the offering of the Poll Players next week.  
Sidney Toler, a distinguished actor-author, was the creator of "The Belle of Richmond," which will be presented to a Washington audience for the first time next week through the enterprise of Mr. Poll.

Richmond, Virginia, is the locale of the play, and while the period is modern, the settings are illustrative of the homes of the first families of Virginia, and the treatment of the theme represents the courtesy and hospitality for which the Southland is famous.

"The Clown" tells a story of circus life and brings to light the big heartedness and unselfish nature of clown who risked his life to save one of his little admirers, and later sacrificed his career to protect another.  
"The Fireman" is said to offer Charlie Chaplin many opportunities to display his peculiar humor, which he does in a manner purely Chaplinesque.  
Thursday, Friday and Saturday Ann Pennington, of the Ziegfeld Follies, will make her motion picture debut in a photoplay musical comedy life entitled "Susie Snowflake."

**Cosmo—Vaudeville.**  
Percy Winter and his associate players in "For Dear Old Penn" made such a marked hit with their offering the first half of the week that the management at Cosmo's Theater has retained the act for the full week. It is a playlet far above the vaudeville average.

The leading feminine roles will be enacted by Miss Hazel Grant, Miss Edith Kohne and Miss Bessie Palmer, ably assisted by the big Lyceum beauty chorus.

**Garden—Feature Films.**  
There will be a triple feature program from Sunday to Wednesday at Moore's Garden Theater, the headline attraction being Charlie Chaplin in his latest, Mutual whirlwind "mirth," "The Tramp." The piece has been especially constructed for Mr. Chaplin's use and provides the famous funmaker with many opportunities to create laughter. On Thursday, Friday and Saturday Helen Holmes, late star of "The Girl and the Game," will lead the program in her latest Mutual Star production of luxe and luster, "The Flower of the Month." The extra feature will be "The Sealed Room" enacted by a cast of screen stars including Mary Pickford, Henry Fonda, Blanche Sweet, Mark Sennett, and Marion Leonard. In addition the bill will also include a cartoon composed by Tom Powers, whose "Bringing Up Father" is well known to newspaper readers. There will be special musical accompaniments by the Garden Symphony Orchestra.

**Strand—Feature Films.**

Afternoon and evening concerts by the Soldiers' Home Band will be the added feature at Glen Echo Park next Sunday for the benefit of the resort's patrons.  
This week, in addition to the amusement devices and other local attractions that Glen Echo offers, a special bill is being shown in the open-air theaterium. The free movies are one of the most popular features.
