

WILDWOOD READY FOR JULY FOURTH

Popular Jersey Resort Makes Elaborate Plans for Independence Day.

Wildwood, N. J., June 24.—With the great "American Day" but a short distance off, everything bids fair for a most satisfactory occasion in Wildwood, and the water resort, Wildwood Crest, on Independence Day.

On Saturday, July 1, Director Walter Pfeiffer and his orchestra composed of twenty-five members of the Philadelphia orchestra, will begin his engagement of eleven weeks at this resort. The orchestra will play daily in the large new Auditorium of the Casino Pier Company.

In connection with the concert of this orchestra, the committee has arranged for the services of well-known artists in the musical world, who will sing at the week-end concerts. Among those already engaged are Johannes Sembach, the noted tenor; Madame Milanie Kurt, soprano; and Madame Margarete Matzenauer, contralto.

The great Philadelphia-Wildwood automobile run is staged for Saturday, July 1, when it is expected from 500 to 700 cars will take part in the day's run, trying to make more than 250 miles. A number of the best known clubs of Philadelphia and Camden will participate in the run, but the greatest number will fly the flag of the Automobile Club of Delaware County, under whose auspices the event is being held.

A large delegation of suffragists also will take part, including members of the Equal Franchise Society and the Congressional Union. The latter two are expected to be striking figures in the boardwalk parade, which will be one of the features of the celebration of Monday, July 3.

In order to prevent any breaking of the speed laws, the run will be made on what is known as a secret time schedule. Prison Airshaft Brings Airman Gilbert Liberty

Third Escape of Interned French Aviator Rivals Movie Thrillers—Taken Away in Auto and Hidden Until Well Disguised—Sprints Across the Border.

Special Correspondent of The Washington Herald, Paris, June 24.—"Never two without a third" is a French proverb which has proved true in the case of Aviator Gilbert.

Forced to descend in Switzerland, owing to his motor falling, Gilbert was interned. His first attempt to escape was successful, but the French government handed him back to the Swiss authorities, because the letter in which Gilbert took back his pledge not to try to escape had not reached the authorities in sufficient time, although it had been posted early enough.

A second attempt was much more short-lived, as the aviator was recognized on a train before getting out of the country, and once more made a prisoner, with greatly increased precautions to prevent another attempt.

The third attempt, which the cables have already reported to have been a complete success, involves a story that will rival the movies. At the back of it are Gilbert's fellow-townsmen from the Auvergne province, the manufacturer of the motor that Gilbert used on his aeroplanes, and a Paris newspaper, which has the largest circulation in the world.

Gilbert Closely Guarded. Gilbert was imprisoned in the third story of a large barracks in Zurich and was watched night and day by special guards. One day a Frenchman arrived on the scene, a M. Robere-Melara, ostensibly a dealer in furs, but really a general commission agent, who had acted as a Sherlock Holmes on various occasions, especially since the war.

"It took me three months to arrange affairs," M. Melara relates. "For I met with several difficulties. The first thing I had to do was to inspire confidence in some one around Gilbert, who would allow me, without being aware of it, to get into close touch with the man whose escape I was to aid. Such a man I found in Capt. Sturm, who was charged with watching over the prisoner and was inflexible as to his duties.

"I made no secret of being a friend of Gilbert's, but I explained that although I was glad to see him again, I had come to Switzerland on business. To convince the captain I talked to him and showed him heavy orders I had given in accordance with orders received from various aviation and other firms in France. I ordered all sorts of things, one day buying several cords of wood. All these orders started, but somehow or other some combination prevented delivery and in the end few went through.

Escape Cleverly Contrived. "I soon found Capt. Sturm's weak point. It was gastronomic. We lunched together, and I had dinner and supper together, and the fare was always so good that he soon allowed me to see his prisoner almost daily. Before the captain we talked about the weather and such exciting topics, but we wrote each other dozens of little notes which we used to slip under the table as we raised our glasses to the captain's health.

"That lasted three whole months, by which time Sturm and I were inseparable and Gilbert and I had formed our plans. "A certain person was to pass in front of the barracks at 7:30 p. m. If he lit his cigarette twice in front of the railing between the barracks and the police station, the attempt was to be made that night, but if he blew his nose ostentatiously it meant the attempt was to be postponed. Gilbert knew that he could escape by a ventilation shaft that passed through the lavatory on his landing.
