

# Nationals Finally Win From Yankees---Selden Wins Tennis Title

## McBride's Timely Bingle Defeats New York Yanks

### Griffmen Capture Long-drawn-out Overtime Game by 9-to-8 Score.

### JOHNSON TO THE RESCUE

New York, June 26.—Those Yankee upstarts who had the nerve to tumble the Griffmen into the second division were made to behave this afternoon, the Nationals finally winning a ball game here, 9 to 8, but it took eleven innings and three of our best pitchers to turn the trick.

Frank Baker got his customary home run drive into the stands and as usual there was a man on the bases when he unleashed the batter.

Gallia and Harper worried along until the eighth inning, but neither appeared to be overburdened with effectiveness and the Old Fox took no chances, for he called upon Walter Johnson to save the day.

Johnson had his troubles, too, for the New Yorkers knotted the count in the ninth inning, but after that spasm Walter had 'em on the run.

The game lasted more than three hours. It was long-drawn out and tiresome. The Nationals put over a tally in the eleventh, which proved sufficient and it was a good thing they did, for the game would surely have been called on account of darkness after the Yanks had been retired in the second half of the chapter.

### Nationals Take Lead.

There seemed to be no way to keep those pesky Yankees off the bases and to prohibit runs. The Nationals piled on an early lead of seven tallies, but New York kept plugging away and finally in the seventh pulled up to within one notch of Washington's count.

Ray Fisher was on the mound when the game opened, but he was yanked in the fourth and Slim Love finished the inning. Following Fisher came Markle, only to give way to Shawkey when the ninth opened.

The Griffmen amassed all ten seven-inning hits off Donovan's slabmen. New York got to our hurlers for eight, but bases on balls proved costly, and the only two errors charged also helped the enemy.

Capt. George McBride put over the winning run with a whistling double to the left field stand, scoring Rippy Williams from first base. Henri Rondeau was benched in the fifth and Turney Barber got into his first game since the club has been on the road.

### Fisher Is Easy.

Ray Fisher, usually an enigma, was the softest kind of pickings. The Vermont schoolmaster survived the opening round, but got his bumps proper in the second, when the Griffmen batted completely around before the side was retired.

Shanks opened the second with a single to left. Judge followed with a double, Jamieson and Henry with scratch singles. McBride walked, and on Moeller's long fly to Magee three runs splashed over the plate. In addition to this bombardment, Baker and Peckinpah contributed fumbles.

The Nationals added another tally in the third. Judge singled and stole. Henry followed with a safe blow, scoring Judge. Gallia opened the Nationals' half of the fourth with a clean drive to center and out came Fisher in favor of our old friend, Slim Love, who was promptly mannaed for three hits almost in a row, an da trio more of Washington runs was thalped up.

### Start on Gallia.

The Yanks got to Gallia for a run in the second and another in the third, and when the Texan after retiring Magee walked the next two batters he was sent to the showers, Harry Harper replacing him. On Latham's double, High's single and McBride's error, New York grabbed three runs, placing the figures New York, 5; Washington, 7.

Markle, who was in the box when Washington came to bat in the fifth, got away with it until the seventh when Henry walked, got around to third on an infield out and Moeller's single, and scored when, with Moeller, the big catcher successfully pulled off the double steal.

A pass to Peckinpah to start New

York's half of the seventh proved fatal to Harper, for along came Home Run Baker and slashed the ball into the right field pavilion and trotted around the bags behove Peckinpah. This made things interesting for the score read New York, 7; Washington, 8, and the crowd got busy with a vengeance.

**Johnson Takes Mound.**

Griff decided that Harper would not do and called for Walter Johnson, who easily blanked the enemy until the ninth, when pandemonium reigned, and the Yanks tied the score in a peculiar manner. High, first up, was fairly struck out, but the third strike got away from Ainsmith and the little outfielder pulled up at first base. Peck and Pipp were easy, but Frank Baker was passed on purpose to get Lee Magee; the last named with two strikes on him drove the ball past McBride, scoring High, as Barber backing up, fumbled the ball.

Bob Shawkey relieved Markle when the Nationals were up in the ninth and was invincible until the eleventh when Rippy Williams drew a base on balls. Barber and Ainsmith died in turn, but Capt. McBride was there with the goods in a pinch, and walloped the ball to left center scoring Alva Williams with what proved to be the winning run.

### SELDEN LANDS JUNIOR TITLE

Any one watching the matches in the final rounds of the District junior tennis championship tournament on the Princeton Club's courts yesterday afternoon had thought, from the brand of tennis shown, that they were watching a championship match in the senior class.

In the singles, Harold Selden, last year's runner-up, won the title, with Howard Cissel as runner-up, 6-4, 5-7, 5-1. In this match, Selden looked to be a more finished player, and he really did not let himself out until the last set. After taking the opener, 6-4, Selden appeared to "loaf" to a certain extent, and before he could get back on his game Cissel had the second set tucked away.

After a few minutes' rest, the match was resumed, and Selden, playing one of his best games, took it in rather easy fashion, 6-1. Throughout the match, Cissel played in unusually hard luck in losing many points by only a few inches over the back line. Then, again, he was unfortunate in his smashes, as he had any number of chances for kills, but failed to take advantage of them, especially at critical stages, when points meant game. His placements were good, but he was simply outplayed by Selden, who was all over the court, and appeared to be equally strong with his back and forehand strokes.

Selden's victory was a very popular one to the youngsters who are looking ahead, as he will be ineligible to compete in next year's event because of his age, and as Howard, last year's winner, is in the same fix, the trophy can not be won by either of them, which means that it is just the same as a new one, and will have to be won by one of the coming generation. His all-around game improved and he was very ably seconded by Fisher, who is the champion of the Washington Suburban Club. These two also showed better teamwork than Selden and Le Fevre who were frequently out of position. Selden's work lacked "pep" and his partner, while making a number of good shots, did not play the game he is capable of putting up.

The Cissel-Le Fevre team won the first set rather handily, 6-2, but things looked very bad for them in the second as at the end of the seventh game, the score was 6-2 against them. It was here that their good teamwork showed up and also their superior steadiness and by a splendid rally they took the straight games which gave them the set, match and title.
