2 HIGHWAYMEN HALT CONSTABLE

Forestville (Md.) Officer Replies With Shot, Presumably Hitting One.

Two masked highwaymen leaped out of the brush lining the Marlboro Pike just across the District line, early yesterday morning, and leveled their revolvers at Constable Robert L. Anderson, of Forestville, Md., who was driving by in a runabout.

Terrified by the sound of the shot, Anderson's horse leaped forward, and ran away. Anderson had dropped the reins when he drew his weapon, and it took him some time to recover them.

HOUSE RUSHES WAR MEASURES

Committee Urges Passage of \$25,000,000 to Defray Mexican Campaign.

War measures designed to clear away all legal difficulties and to supply men and money for war with Mexico absorbed the attention of the House yesterday.

During a session of less than three hours, the following steps were taken by the House and committees toward complete military preparation.

The Naval Affairs Committee voted a favorable report in a bill "Federalizing" the naval militia and authorizing the President to draft the naval militia into the Federal service in time of emergency.

The Appropriations Committee recommended the passage of an urgent deficiency bill carrying \$25,652,068.83, to defray the expenses of mobilizing and equipping the militia and transporting it to Mexico.

The Military Affairs Committee reported the Military Academy appropriation bill, carrying more than \$2,000,000 for the conduct of the West Point officers' school.

The House voted, 119 to 5, to insist upon its provision in the resolution, authorizing the President to draft the militia, which would provide \$1,000,000 for the relief of dependent families of Guardsmen called to the front.
