

# With the Washington Churches

## EPISCOPAL.

For "Citizenship Sunday" the Bishop of Washington and the Chapter of the National Cathedral have arranged a special service at the Cathedral Close, Mt. St. Alban, with an appropriate sermon by Rev. Dr. Z. Barney Phillips, who comes to Washington from the West especially for tomorrow's service.

Dr. Phillips' topic will be "The Spirit of Our Fathers," popular and national hymns will be sung, the vested Cathedral Choir, leading the congregation. If the weather permits the service will be held at the Peace Cross erected in 1882 to commemorate the re-establishment of peace with Spain. In case of rain Bethlehem Chapel will be used.

At the Church of the Epiphany tomorrow will be observed as Citizenship Sunday and the pastor, Rev. Dr. R. H. McKim, has sent out a strong appeal to his people to attend patriotically and to bring a generous offering for the thousands of blinded and maimed soldiers and other victims of the war in Europe and Asia. It is hoped that on the Sunday next to Independence Day a very large gift will be gathered to show America's sympathy with these pitiable unfortunates. Kipling's "Recessional" will be sung as well as patriotic hymns. The assistant minister, Rev. P. F. Hall, will preach on "What Are We Doing for the least of His Brethren." Rev. Mr. Hall will also preach at night on the "Third Beatitude, the Meek Inheriting the Earth."

At the Church of St. Michael and All Angels, Twenty-second and Virginia avenue northwest, the service at 11 a. m. tomorrow will include patriotic music and an address on "Citizenship."

## DISCIPLES OF CHRIST.

Rev. George A. Miller, pastor of the Ninth Street Christian Church, will dedicate tomorrow a new church building at Bethlehem, on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. His pulpit will be occupied in the morning by G. B. Nations, of Missouri, and at night by Dean Vernon Stauffer, of Hiram College, Hiram, Ohio. The regular services of this church are to be continued throughout the summer.

Rev. Earl Wilkey, pastor of the Vermont Avenue Christian Church, will preach an appropriate sermon tomorrow morning, when the church and Sunday-school will hold patriotic services in honor of Independence Day. A collection for the benefit of the war sufferers of Europe and Asia will be taken at the morning service.

## METHODIST.

An Epworth League conference of M. E. Churches South, will be held at Charles Town, W. Va., next week from Thursday to Saturday, July 6 to 8, which will be attended by delegates from each of the league chapters in local churches of this denomination.

Rev. Dr. H. M. Canter, presiding elder of Washington district, will conduct an institute for preachers at Epworth Church on Monday, July 10. Evangelism, mission effort and finances will be considered in the sessions which will continue throughout the day. About twenty-eight ministers of the Baltimore South Methodist conference are expected to attend. The ladies of Epworth Church will serve lunch for the preachers.

The Mount Rainier Mission of St. Paul M. E. Church South has obtained a tent to be used for its services during the summer. The tent will be raised and ready for use on Sunday, July 9. Rev. D. L. Blakemore, pastor of St. Paul, is in charge of the work at Mount Rainier.

Mount Vernon Place M. E. Church has selected as its delegate to the Charles Town Epworth League conference Miss Eula Dawkins. Rev. Dr. H. M. Canter, presiding elder, will preach tomorrow evening at Mount Vernon Place Church.

Homer J. Councillor will speak at the morning services of North Carolina Avenue Methodist Protestant Church tomorrow, using as his subject, "The True Patriot."

Following an annual custom, the old folks in the Methodist Home, at Sixth and M streets, will be brought in automobiles to Foundry Methodist Episcopal Church tomorrow morning, when the pastor, Rev. W. R. Wedderspoon, D. D., will preach an appropriate sermon on the theme, "Light at Evening Time," and administer the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

A patriotic service will be held in the evening. The pastor will deliver an address on "Citizenship," and Rev. W. F. Crofts, D. D., will speak on "Our Country's Needs." Dr. Crofts has just returned from a tour in the West, where this address has been received with enthusiasm.

At Douglas Memorial M. E. Church joint choirs of church and Epworth League are to render specially prepared patriotic music tomorrow and the pastor, Rev. Dr. C. C. McLean, will preach on "Ideal Citizenship" and "True Patriotism" at the 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. services.

## BAPTIST.

Rev. F. Paul Langhorne, late of the South Broad Street Baptist Church, Philadelphia, begins tomorrow his duties as the pastor of the Petworth Baptist Church at Seventh and Randolph streets, this city. With other members of family, Mr. Langhorne arrived in Washington from Philadelphia this morning. The subject of his morning sermon tomorrow will be "Our Covenant." Sunday evening's sermon will be on the subject, "A Divine Appeal."

Rev. Mr. Langhorne was born at Newport, Ky., on May 9, 1882, and studied for the ministry at Temple and at Bucknell Universities and graduated with honors from the Crozer Theological Seminary. He has served as pastor of Baptist Church at Conningdale, Pa., Portsmouth, Ohio, and Philadelphia, and was at one time in charge of important interdenominational religious work in New York City. It has been announced that on Wednesday evening, July 6, a formal recognition service will be held at the Petworth Church, at which time Mr. Langhorne will be installed as the active pastor of the church. Dean William Albur Wilbur will preside at this meeting and address will be made by Rev. G. Ellis Williams, representing the Methodists of Petworth; Rev. J. Alvin Campbell for the Presbyterians, Rev. W. W. MacMaster and others. Special music under the direction of Mrs. Harry M. Test, with Mrs. Potter as soloist, will also be rendered.

At the last Sunday evening service of this church a special program of music was given by the choir, out of compliment to Dr. Langhorne, who had served the church as acting pastor for the past several months. With Mrs. Test at the piano, and Mrs. Minnie Hoch Smith, violinist, James L. Jones, Miss Belva Hoch and John C. Smith sang solos.

In order to stimulate the habit of regular church attendance on the part of boys and girls the pastor and deacons of Immanuel Baptist Church have offered a suitable token to each boy and girl who attends a church service on each Sunday during the last six months of this year without missing more than three times. The committee in charge of the plan consists of G. W. Stewart, chairman, L. Ladson and L. B. Grimes.

Rev. Gove G. Johnson, pastor of Immanuel, will be in his pulpit for the first three Sundays of July, and the evening services will be held on the lawn if the weather is favorable. During Dr. Johnson's vacation his pulpit will be supplied by Rev. Charles L. Collins, D. D., pastor of the Baptist Church in DeLand, Fla.

Dr. R. E. Chambers of Canton, China, who for the past eighteen years has been a missionary of the Fifth Baptist Church, will be in Washington tomorrow and will preach in Fifth Church at both morning and evening services. Dr. Chambers organized and is now president of the Chinese Baptist Publication Society.

At the Second Baptist Church, Fourth street and Virginia avenue southeast, tomorrow night at 8 p. m., there will be a patriotic exercise in which sixty boys and girls, each with a silk American flag, will sing patriotic songs. This will be followed by a baptismal service. The pastor, Rev. H. L. Stewart, will preside. "The Battle of the Aimless Arrow," the third sermon in the series on "Bible Battles and the European War." At 11 a. m. Mr. Stewart will discuss the topic, "Two Kings and a Fighting Parson."

Rev. E. Hez Swam, pastor of the Centennial Baptist Church, is to preach a special sermon tomorrow night to the United Order of United American Mechanics, and chairs will be reserved for them. All the services of the church will be continued during the summer.

## CONGREGATIONAL.

The service tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock at Mount Pleasant Congregational Church will be the last one to be conducted by the pastor, Rev. Clarence A. Vincent, D. D., prior to his summer vacation. The music will be in charge of Claude Robeson, organist, Mrs. A. L. Haycock, soprano, and James S. Hicks, bass, members of the regular quartet of the church, will assist in the singing during the month of July. Mrs. Ada Arundel-Pillow, contralto, and Charles D. Church, tenor, will be on duty during August, this arrangement affording a summer vacation for the quartet.

The union adult Bible class, which meets at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning will be addressed by Prof. E. C. Bingham, of Lafayette College, the subject being "Heroism in the Christian Conquest."

The service held last Sunday morning in which Miss Emma Webb was given a missionary's commission was very impressive. The participants were Mrs. A. M. Farrington, representing the missionary societies of the church; Walter P. Harman, superintendent of the junior division of the Sunday school, in which Miss Webb was a teacher for several years; Rev. E. M. Bliss, a former missionary to Turkey; Rev. W. E. De Belem, former missionary to India; Rev. Clarence A. Vincent, pastor, who was delegated by the American Foreign Society to officially present the commission, and Rev. Franklin Noble, a member of the church, who is the middle daughter of Miss Webb, who is a granddaughter of Senator Thomas Sterling, of South Dakota, and a former student at the University of South Dakota, will leave Washington on a visit to friends in Wisconsin, Colorado and California, and on August 10 will sail from Vancouver for India. Upon her arrival at Madras, India, she will be married to A. A. Martin, of Boulder, Colo., who is identified with the missionary work in India.

Rev. Wilbur F. Crafts, D. D., superintendent of the International Reform Bureau, this city, will preach tomorrow morning at First Congregational Church on the subject, "Back to the Bible." The Christian Endeavor Society will conduct the only service in the evening at 7 o'clock.

## PRESBYTERIAN.

Rev. Joseph T. Kelly, D. D., will preach on "Christian Citizenship" at the Fourth Presbyterian Church tomorrow morning at the 11 o'clock service.

Rev. Samuel A. Bower will conduct the evangelistic service in the tent at Thirteenth and Fairmont streets northwest, at 8 o'clock.
