PROGRAM FOR FOURTH READY

Tournament, Parade, Athletic Events and Fireworks Are Scheduled.

The above is the prediction that is generally voiced among the members of the Citizens' Committee on the Independence Day celebration, of which District Commissioner Oliver P. Newman is chairman.

There will be a bigger fireworks display than ever before. The tournament committee is more than gratified at the entries in the events carded for the afternoon of the Fourth, and many athletes are entered for the games which will take place at the Monument Grounds in the morning.

While Commissioner Newman is gratified at the response that the public has made to the appeals for funds, the committee finds that it is still short about \$200 to complete the budget necessary for carrying forward the day's program.

Melvin C. Hazen, chairman of the tournament committee, announced that the afternoon program will start at 2:30 o'clock at the Brightwood Reservoir. Hundreds of families will take advantage of the national holiday for a picnic in Rock Creek and Zoological Parks and can thus be within easy reach of the tournament grounds adjoining the Brightwood Reservoir.
