Heavy Program of Events For Celebration of Fourth

INDEPENDENCE DAY PROGRAM.

- 9:30 a. m.—Track and field events, Monument Grounds.
 - 10 a. m.—Labor parade starts from Peace Monument.
 - 10 a. m.—"Americanization Day" celebration at base of Washington Monument.
 - 11 a. m.—Address by President Wilson at dedication of new building of American Federation of Labor.
 - 11 a. m.—Swimming events, municipal bathing beach.
 - 12 noon—Patriotic observance by Association of Oldest Inhabitants at engine house, Nineteenth and H streets.
 - 2:30 p. m.—Horse show and riding carnival at Brightwood reservoir.
 - 6 p. m.—Marine Band concert on Monument Grounds followed by display of fireworks.
- All day celebration at Drummond, Somerset, Congress Heights, and special exercises at Petworth, Piney Branch, Brookland, and Riverdale.

The Fourth in Washington will be marked by a continuous round of festivities, parades, field events, speechmaking, swimming demonstrations, firework exhibitions and other celebrations.

The day's program, with the big labor parade and President Wilson's address at the dedication of the new building of the American Federation of Labor, as the outstanding feature, will begin at 9:30 o'clock with the track and field events on the Monument Grounds and close with the Marine Band concert and gigantic fireworks display, at the same location, ten hours later.

Midday, junior and senior, swimming events with plunges, diving and underwater swimming contests, are on the program for the aquatic tournament, scheduled for 11 o'clock at the Municipal bathing beach.

William F. Gude, Dr. John Constan, Salvatore Desio and Dr. Leopold Glushak are to be speakers at the "Americanization Exercises" at the Monument on the Monument grounds at 10 o'clock, under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution.

A special invitation to the 500 recently naturalized citizens residing in the District of Columbia, to attend these exercises has been issued. The Marine Band will furnish the music.

The Petworth Citizens' Association announces a children's parade at 9:15 o'clock followed by patriotic exercises on the School playgrounds. Athletic events and a basket luncheon in the afternoon and speechmaking in the evening will follow. A children's parade will also be held in Piney Branch section according to J. Walter Thompson, in charge of the arrangements.

A baseball game and races between married and single men are the features of the all-day program for Drummond and Somerset, Md. All other suburbs have arranged programs or are planning to cooperate with other communities in celebrating.

LABOR TEMPLE PROGRAM READY

Twenty Thousand Workers Will See New Home Dedicated on Fourth.

The biggest event in Washington tomorrow will be the dedication of the new home of the American Federation of Labor, at Ninth street and Massachusetts avenue northwest, with President Wilson, members of his cabinet and other high government and labor officials in attendance.

The exercises will be preceded by a labor parade with 20,000 organized workers in line. Divided into six sections, each representing a trade, the parade will start from Peace Monument at 10 o'clock sharp. Like the recent preparedness parade, it will be set off by a series of floats, depicting the various trades.

The parade will pass up Pennsylvania avenue to Fifteenth street, north to K street, east to Tenth street, north to Massachusetts avenue, and thence past the building, where President Wilson and members of cabinet will review the marchers. The parade will disband at Eighth street and Mount Vernon place.

As soon as the parade ends all the bands in line will unite and give a grand concert of national anthems near the building. Following the band concert, President Wilson and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, will speak.

The dedicatory exercises will be brief, after which the trustees of the American Federation of Labor—James O'Connell, Samuel Gompers and Frank Morrison—will take over what the federation has always needed—a home of its own.

Labor organizations from all parts of the United States and England will be represented by delegates at the exercises.




