Harper Humbles Browns In Hard-Fought Contest

Griffen Get to Davenport in Fifth Inning for Enough Runs to Win.

THE FINAL SCORE IS 2 TO 1

Dan Moeller's Double and Foster's Sacrifice Fly Put Over the Winning Markers.

Harry Harper had it on the St. Louis Browns again yesterday, winning his fourth game of the season from the Joneses, by 2 to 1. It was a narrow squeak for Harper, but his teammates managed to unhook a batting line in the fifth inning and the lanky southpaw was equal to the task of holding the Mound City tourists to a single run.

Harper allowed five hits. The Griffen got to big Dave Davenport for seven of these being bunched in the fifth frame. Both teams contributed errors but none of the miscues figured in the scoring.

Yesterday's game was a good one to watch--just close enough to keep the spectators on edge despite the sizzling heat. Even with two down in the visitors' half of the ninth, Pratt singled and Marsans walked, placing the winning run on the sacks, but Harper pulled himself together and whiffed "Shorty" Lavan, ending the combat.

The Browns have beaten the Nationals but twice in ten starts this season and despite Fielder Jones' alibi, the Missouri crowd has been outclassed in every department of the game.

Winning two out of three just played and with a patched up team is considerable of a feat. The Griffen have been badly crippled all week, but at that, have given a fine account of themselves and are still within a few games of first place--in other words, not out of the pennant race by a long shot.

Davenport Beaten Again.

Big Davenport, who finished the game Thursday, after the Nationals had knocked Wellman out of the box, was assigned to work again yesterday. Davenport had our side guessing until the fourth, when Foster singled, watched Milan and Williams die in turn, and Barber draw a base on balls. Henry whiffed for the final out.

In the fifth inning, the Griffen shot over two runs and packed away the old game. The tallies came in a perfectly orthodox manner--clean hitting that delighted the fans--every wallop a real buster and the ball hit right on the nose. Capt. McBride opened the fifth with a single to center. Sawyer was thrown out by Davenport, McBride pulling up at second base. Harper shot a safety to left advancing McBride to third base. Moeller doubled to left center scoring McBride, and putting Harper on third. Foster filed to Shotton and on the out Harper scored. Shotton's peg to third base was wide, the ball eluding Johnson and rolling to the Washington dugout. Moeller rounded third on the bad leg and started leisurely for the plate, believing that Umpire Nallin would permit him an extra base, but this Nallin refused to do, and before Moeller could scramble, back Johnson had sneaked around behind him grabbed the ball on a throw from Sisler, and Moeller was declared out, ending the inning.

Griffen Miss Opportunity.

The Nationals missed a good chance to score in the sixth when with two down, Williams on third, and Henry on second, Ray attempted to pull off the double play with John. Umpire Dinsen declared Williams out, the play being misjudged.

It looked as if the Browns might score in the seventh, when with one down Miller singled, was wild pitched to second, and Sisler walked, but Pratt's roller to Harper forced Miller at third, and Marsans fanned, closing the chapter.

Capital City Fighting "Cop" Gets Early Lead and Obtains Even Break.

ALL-STAR CARD IS GOOD

Baltimore, Md., July 8.--Outweighed twenty-five pounds but not-outaged one ounce, is the easiest way of describing the result of the American Athletic Association hold that Mike Uraime, of Washington, and Young Herman Miller, of Baltimore, participated in at Oriole Park here this afternoon.

It was the first of a series of bouts which the live Monumental City promoter has carded for this week. It is Elks' week in Baltimore and the local promoters are busy with staging fistic carnivals so the B. F. O. E.'s will have an opportunity of witnessing some of the best battles in the various classes in the East.

The Uraime-Miller bout was the main attraction of an all-star card which the American Athletic Association held and to say it was a furious affair is putting it mildly, but it was a grand ending of what had proven to be a "perfect day" for 1500 fight fans who journeyed over to the East side to witness the show.

The handsome fighting policeman of the Capital City went after Miller like the middle-weight championship of the world was at stake and it was only the early lead which he gained that gave him an even break with the sturdy Baltimorean. It was tough going over this ten-round route for both of these athletes, as Uraime got away with a lead and had Miller guessing through the early rounds.

Uraime, who had been in the ring for a long time, was in the best shape and fought the Washingtonian off his feet in the ninth and tenth.

It was an open-air affair and the rays of the hot afternoon sun had a great deal to do with the weakening of the athletes who participated in the trial of bouts. It was noticeable that each attempted to fight his opponent into the sun glare and it was quite a scramble when each party entered the ring to obtain the shady corner.

Although Uraime piled up an early lead on Miller, this brawny native son was a tough customer, as he took everything that Mike sent out in the first seven rounds, but both boys seem to finish under the aggressiveness of his lighter opponent. Uraime used a lightning left in the early session which kept the local lad backing up.

Miller had no trouble in landing this jab, but he became a little careless in the second round when Miller put over the haymaker and sent the Capital City lad to his knees. He was up in a flash and was back on his opponent.

At toe to toe with Miller, Uraime proved to be an even terms with him, and when Miller attempted to box, Uraime would always land the margin. It was the shifting tactics and great infighting that saved Uraime during the early going, while he also showed some effective work in sending off a strong right punch, and often beat Miller at his own game of putting in the haymaker.

In the seventh and eighth rounds Uraime was on Miller all the time and landed a number of body blows, but these two seasons seem to finish the Washington policeman, as Miller was a great deal fresher in the ninth and tenth and handed a good lesson to Uraime.
