Rev. Dr. Van Schaick Named President of School Board

Chosen to Succeed Henry P. Blair by Vote of 5 to 4. E. H. Daniels Elected to Succeed Himself as Vice President.

Rev. Dr. Van Schaick, Jr., was elected president of the Board of Education, to succeed Henry P. Blair, at the organizational meeting of the board held at the Franklin School yesterday afternoon. Dr. Van Schaick was elected over his opponent, Ernest H. Daniels, by a vote of 5 to 4.

Mr. Daniels was elected vice president, by acclamation, to succeed himself. Dr. Van Schaick was appointed a member of the board July 1, to succeed Henry P. Blair as a member, the latter's tenure of office expiring on that date. Mr. Blair has held the office of president during the past three years.

A feeling of tension permeated the board just before the close of the session when Mrs. Susie Root Rhodes, as one of the two remaining members of the old text-book committee, refused to concur in the recommendation of Superintendent Thurston for several changes embodied in the annual appropriation report. Mrs. Rhodes asserted that she did not believe the changes recommended by Mr. Thurston necessary, and demanded that the report be referred to the new committee for consideration.

John P. Larner, the other member of the old committee, urged the acceptance of the report, which carries an appropriation of \$96,000. He stated that he had examined the recommendations carefully and could find nothing objectionable. By a vote of the board the report was tabled for reference to the new committee which President Van Schaick announced he would appoint on his return to the city a week hence. The report was referred to the committee with power to act.

The following changes were announced by the board: Charles Reece, temporary laborer, Birney School; Ralph Grant, temporary laborer, Garnet School; Miss E. N. Boyd, temporary teacher, class 2, Montgomery School; Valerie Chase, principal Birney School playground; Edith Chandler, assistant at Birney school playground; A. C. Newman, principal Armstrong School, and M. E. Henson, teacher, class 3, Cardozo School.

Transfers: G. C. W. Wilkinson, principal Armstrong School to principal of M Street High School; Cornelius Sullivan, janitor, from Greenleaf to Amidon, and E. A. Rich, janitor, from Amidon to Greenleaf.

Resignations: E. H. Reade, medical inspector and B. E. Madden, principal, Birney School playground.
