**MILITIA MAY REMAIN ON BORDER SIX MONTHS**

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**Bring in Shipwrecked Crew.**

Havana, July 25.—The captain and crew of six of the American schooner Virginia Rulon, which sank forty miles off Cape Hatteras July 18, have been brought to port by the steamship Santa Clara, bound from New York. The men were picked up from lifeboats on July 23.

**Germans Lose 50,000 Men.**

Copenhagen, July 25.—The Petrograd correspondent of the newspaper Pilotiken estimates that Gen von Linsengens' German army, which has been bearing the brunt of the Russian assaults on the Lipa River in Volhynia, has lost 50,000 men, or one-third of the whole force.

**NINETEEN DEAD IN TUBE BLAST**

Dozen Injured in Explosion in Water Works Tunnel Under Lake Erie.

(By the International News Service.) Cleveland, Ohio, July 25.—Nineteen men are known to be dead and a dozen injured as a result of an explosion of gas in a water works tunnel under construction between pumping station on land and an intake crib five miles out in Lake Erie late last night.

The men were working fifty feet below the bottom of the lake, and 120 feet below the street level.

The explosion came as the tunnel workers broke through a gas vein with their picks and shovels and the fumes ignited from electric lamps.

Ten bodies were brought to shore on a tugboat at 10 a. m. Nine more are known to be in the tube and the rescuers are digging their way through the debris to bring out the remaining bodies.

**DEADLY GAS MAY PROVE FATAL TO J. G. SCHAMEL**

Firemen Use Gas Helmets to Rescue Victim of Ammonia Fumes.

Quick work of firemen in cutting their way into a basement room of the Old Dutch Market at Seventh street and Florida avenue, filled with ammonia fumes, in which John G. Schamel, of 36 Virginia avenue southwest, manager of the store, was trapped, may yet prove futile.

**SHARK-SCARED, CROWD LETS BATHER DROWN**

Man Cries for Help, But Onlookers Fear to Go to Rescue—Body Recovered 20 Minutes Later.

New York, July 25.—Not sharks, but the fear of sharks, caused the death of a man yesterday in the Shrewsbury River, near Atlantic Highlands, N. J. Samuel Harding, 35, of Newark, went swimming off Grevelly Point and was not far from the shore when he threw up his hands and called for help.

Examination of witnesses will be started tomorrow morning, at which time several widely known social workers will be brought before the jurors to give that body a viewpoint of conditions with regard to commercialized vice.
