

HOLD REGATTA AT ALEXANDRIA

Old Dominion Crew Proves Easy Winners Over Analoostians of Washington.

Alexandria, Va., Aug. 12.—In the regatta held this afternoon by the Old Dominion Boat Club the centipede crew of the Old Dominion proved easy winners over the crew from the Analoostians of Washington, winning a race of seven-eighths of a mile by fully four lengths. The local crew was given a big ovation by the large throng assembled as they passed the stake boat off the clubhouse of the local crew.

The local crew was composed of Gus Pohl, Leo Pohl, Francis Summers, and J. W. Roberts, and the crew of the Analoostians was composed of Prossie, Tucker, Uhlman and Boyer.

Other events that took place follow: Single canoe, three-eighths of a mile—C. F. Dyson, first; Dr. J. T. Ashton, second; Paul F. Miller, third, and G. H. Wingate, fourth.

Single gigs, half a mile—R. Gaines, first; W. E. Spofford, second; John Curtin, third.

Double canoes, half a mile—C. F. Dyson and Marshall P. Johnson, first; Dr. J. T. Ashton and W. Seidon, Washington, second; Louis Davis and Paul F. Miller, third. This was a close race for the two first-named crews.

Double gig, half a mile—Won by Gus and Leo Pohl over R. Gaines and W. E. Spofford. This was also a close race.

The seniors, in a half-mile race, defeated the juniors by a length and a half. The crew of the seniors was composed of Mueller, Spofford, Douglas and Roberts, and of the juniors, Gus Pohl, Leo Pohl, Francis Summers and R. Gaines.

In the swimming contest, 100 yards, John Curtin was first; W. Seidon, Washington, second; Carroll Pierce, Jr., third, and Stuart King, fourth.

In the diving contest, Carroll Pierce, Jr., was declared the winner, his only opponent being J. T. Preston, Jr. The canoeing contest was called off.

The regatta was attended by a large throng and among the invited guests of the club were a number of women, who occupied seats on the balcony of the clubhouse. During the course of the affair refreshments were served by a committee of women.

The affair was brought to a close with a dance which was attended by a large gathering of the members of the club and their friends.

Lieut. E. C. Anstett, of the coast guard, was detailed here to patrol the course. Accompanied by Mrs. Anstett he came here and with his wife was in a launch with E. E. Craver, clerk of the course. Afterward Mr. Craver entertained Lieut. and Mrs. Anstett and at dinner at the Hotel Rammel. Lieut. Anstett expressed gratification at the excellent manner in which the races were pulled off.

Other officials included J. S. Douglas, Jr., referee and starter; E. E. Craver, clerk of course; L. E. Uhler, A. L. Uhler, Capt. Albert Bryan, Edward H. Kamper and C. Aubrey Callahan, judges at finish.
