INDIANS ARE BEATEN WHEN GALLIA SHOWS AIR-TIGHT TWIRLING

Nationals Get to Coumbe for Enough Runs to Insure the Verdict. Score 3 to 1.

Bert Gallia pitched fine ball yesterday, and beat the Cleveland Indians 3 to 1. Gallia would have had a shut-out but for the fact that Elmer Smith dropped-kicked a single from Graney's bat into left field for a triple.

Frank Coumbe, who has not started a game since July 21, according to Henry Edwards, the word painter on the Cleveland Plain Dealer, essayed to humble the Nationals, but Coumbe only lasted six innings, during which period he was battered hard, much harder than the show shows.

With four left handers on the Washington club, rival managers figure the Griffins easy picking any time a southpaw starts against them, but as a matter of fact, our hard-hitters have invariably done the best work against right side hurling, since the club returned East.

Take the game yesterday for instance, Leonard grabbed himself three safe hits out of four times up. Milan and Smith both delivered, and while Judge was shy in the hit column, he drew a base on balls, which paved the way for a run.

Gallia allowed the Indians seven hits, while the Griffins peppered Coumbe for nine and Covelskie, the relief hurler, for a double.

The Nationals were first to score, putting over a tally in the third inning, when on Foster's single, Leonard followed suit, and on Smith's safe rap, the bases were loaded. Milan's poke to center scored Gallia.

In the sixth, which proved to be the critical chapter, Coumbe was allowed to display his wares. Judge walked after Shanks had been retired, went to second on McBride's infield out, scooted to third when Coumbe threw low to Bergman, to catch him napping, and completed the circuit on Henry's slashing double, the ball going over Graney's head.

The Indians had Gallia in a hole during the first, second, fifth and sixth innings, but Gallia permitted no liberties until the seventh, when with O'Neill on first base, and two out, Graney poked the ball to right center. Milan should have made the catch, but he allowed Smith to try for the ball with the result that Smith got it at his shoe tops, missed the catch and kicked the ball into left field. Before the ball could be returned, O'Neill was over the plate and Graney perched on third. Turner fled to Shanks ending the inning.

As Moeller had been sent up to pinch hit for Coumbe in the seventh Covelskie was in the box when the Nationals came to bat in the final half of this chapter.

Covelskie held our side unless until the eighth, when Elmer Smith paved the way for a tally which was not needed by spanking a double to right field. Shanks' long fly to Graney, put Smith on third, and Judge, when he walked, tied with the infield playing loose, tossed out Judge at first on a hard-hit grounder.

CREWS WORKING OUT FOR LOCAL REGATTA

New Time Set for Starting Races. Prizes Will Go on Display Today.

Now that the names of the crews that will row in the Middle States Regatta here Labor Day, have been announced, the local oarsmen are training for Monday's great event with their minds concentrated just which crew they will have to contend with. Every trial spin from now on will be rowed against that imaginary opponent, for each crew has scanned the entry list and selected some certain crew that he feels might give him the edge on his boat. Each evening the Annapolis Senior club and the various Potomac crews can be seen spurring over the course, putting on the final touch for Monday's trial.

The local oarsmen who are figuring in just which pocket they will wear their gold watch or watches, after their triumph Monday, can have their first glimpse of the prized trophies tomorrow morning, when all of the prizes will be placed on exhibition in the show window of D. J. Kaufman, 1605 Pennsylvania avenue northwest.

There will be fifty-eight handsome gold watches and seventeen elaborate silver plaques. Each man who sits in a winning boat Monday will be the proud possessor of one of those gold watches, while he will have earned for his club one of the silver plaques as a club trophy.

The New Ebbitt House will be regatta headquarters and most of the visiting oarsmen will stop there. Presentation of the prizes will be made to the winners in the lobby of the hotel as soon as practical after the last race is over.

The time for the beginning of the regatta has been set for 10 a. m., and a race will follow every fifteen minutes until 2 p. m., when a recess will be taken until 2 p. m.

The double referee system will be used so there should be no undue delays, and the whole regatta should be over by 5 o'clock at the latest.

All races will be a mile straight away, the start to be at the lowest side of the Three Sister Islands, through the Aqueduct Bridge, and finish off the foot of Thirtieth street.

The course on that day will be in charge of the Revenue Cutter Service and perfect order is assured. The police will also lend their assistance in preserving order and patrolling the course.

A grandstand has been erected at the finish line from which a clear view of the whole course can be obtained. A person sitting on this stand can see the crew when they leave the mark and watch them during the whole period of the race.

As most every good race is generally lost in the spurt at the finish, this is the best place to witness the event, and ample facilities have been arranged at this point for those who want to go into the stand or for those who prefer to go elsewhere in this location. Ample room for every one can be found right opposite the finish line. Automobiles will also have room to park their cars, a large open space being right at the foot of Thirtieth street.

JAP IS BEATEN BY GEORGE M. CHURCH

Ichiya Kumagai Defeated in Straight Sets in Big Tourney, 6-3, 6-3, 6-1.

New York, Aug. 30.—Ichiya Kumagai lost to George M. Church, in three straight sets, 6-3, 6-3, 6-1, at the West Side Tennis Club today. Kumagai made Church play at top speed throughout, however.

At Newport, a few weeks ago, Kumagai defeated William M. Johnston, the present holder of the championship. That match went to five sets. Today Church won from Kumagai in three, and in winning exposed a brand of tennis the like of which has not been seen in the current tournament. Church's extra shot gave birth to an opinion that he will come close to winning the national title.

As a result of his victory Church moved into the third round. He will meet Eugene Warren, a Californian, in the fourth round. Warren will meet the winner of the Theo-Roosevelt-Pell-McLaughlin match on Friday. McLaughlin had an easy time today, and scored over Kenneth Hawks, 6-1, 6-2, 6-4.

Johnston, the title holder, and Richard Norrie Williams, 2d, also came through successfully. Johnston defeated Francis T. Hunter, the Cornell captain, at 6-1, 6-4, 6-4, while Williams won from Robert Leroy, a former intercollegiate champion, at 6-4, 6-1, 7-5.

The only match suggestive of a surprise was that between Harold Throckmorton, the national interscholastic champion, and Leonard Beckman, a former holder of the same title. Beckman, a clever racket wielder, but hardly as strong a player as Throckmorton, was the victor at 6-4, 6-4, 7-5.

Dean Mathew, Robert Lindley Murray, William J. Clothier, Willis E. Davis, Clarence James Griffin, S. Howard Voshell, Wallace F. Johnson, Walter Merrill Hall, Eli H. Whitely, Watson M. Washburn, Nathaniel W. Niles and Karl E. Howell, both came through with wins.

Pell, number five on the national ranking list, gained his third round bracket at the expense of Fred Alexander, 6-4, 6-3, 2-6, 6-3.

Thirty-two matches in all were played today, and early tomorrow play in the third round will be started.
