Officialdom Goes to Long Branch

WHEN officialdom arranged for the trip to Long Branch for the formal notification ceremonies at Shadow Lawn, rumors of the impending railroad strike were nebulous, but despite the hazardous condition of travel, the identical plans have prevailed, and the week-end finds the President and members of his official family gathered at the Jersey resort. The ceremonies must have proved an impressive occasion yesterday on the sloping lawn of the beautiful country estate which lies by the sea, given the very cream of the official world for a distinguished ensemble.

Aside from the President's immediate family, which included Mrs. Wilson, Miss Margaret Wilson, and Miss Helen Woodrow Bones, there were present the Misses Smith, of New Orleans, who were guests at the White House last week, Mr. John Randolph Bolling, Dr. and Mrs. Cary T. Grayson and the Secretary to the President and Mrs. Tumulty. In the company of official folk who witnessed the ceremony were the Vice President and Mrs. Marshall, the Secretary of State and Mrs. Lansing, the Speaker of the House and Mrs. Champ Clark, the Postmaster General and Mrs. Burleson, the Secretary of the Interior and Mrs. Lane, and others. The President and Mrs. Wilson expect to leave Shadow Lawn some time today to attend the ceremonies in connection with the birthplace of Lincoln in Kentucky. They will probably return to New Jersey for the early autumn if Congress adjourns in time.

What with the impending railroad strike and the prevalence of infantile paralysis, official plans are subject to momentary change and that which is arranged today, tomorrow may be abandoned. Week-end plans among official folk went far afield. The delightful house party which the former Secretary of War and Mrs. Lindley M. Garrison had arranged for over Sunday at their Seabright cottage when the Vice President and Mrs. Marshall and the Secretary of State and Mrs. Lansing were to have been among the guests, was canceled owing to the outbreak of the baby scourge in the vicinity, and Mr. and Mrs. Garrison closed their summer home to return to New York.

The Speaker and Mrs. Clark are guests of Representative and Mrs. Thomas G. Patten, of New York, at their summer place at Long Branch over the week-end. Mrs. Clark's interesting visit to Kentucky for the meeting of the McAfee clan, of which her mother was a member, had to be abandoned in the face of the imminent strike. The Speaker and Mrs. Clark expect to spend a short time at their home at Bowling Green, Mo., after the close of Congress, which, each day, seems to grow more problematical. Vice President and Mrs. Marshall's plans also hinge to a large extent on the adjournment. They have given up the Connecticut avenue house which they occupied during the summer and will spend the coming winter in their apartment at the Willard. Directly after the ceremonies at Long Branch they expect to visit their home in Indiana, where the Vice President will receive his formal notification.

Should railroad matters come to a serious pass, the summer sojourners will not be affected for many weeks to come, by which time, no doubt, everything will be amicably adjusted. Fashionable Washington is comfortably installed in summer quarters and there is little thought of closing cottages and turning lanned faces toward the town. The seasons at Newport, Bar Harbor,

and the like, reached their climax a week or so ago, but a fresh stimulus will be given by a number of post-season events, among them weddings of more or less magnitude.
