Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 20.—Joe Boehling played a low-down trick on his former club, the Nationals, this afternoon, in the second battle of the series at Dumm Field, by wheeling the Injuns to a 3-to-2 victory which bowled Griff's upstarts back into their old resting spot, seventh place.

The Nationals took a flying start by rushing over their first run in the second inning as the result of a terrific two-play wallop by Elmer Smith. The Injun discard blew open the period with a liner which was headed for the flag pole in center field, but Graney overruled the pitch.
