

BROKER BACKS REGIME OF WOODROW WILSON

Hard Times Will Not Follow His Re-election, Says Parris.

The opinion prevailing financial circles that the election of Hughes will insure continued prosperity on Wall Street, whereas the re-election of Wilson will jeopardize the boom times, is not unanimous, particularly in local financial circles.

Aldon K. Parris, of the firm of Crane, Parris & Co., bankers, last night registered his vigorous disapproval of this sentiment. Mr. Parris, in addition to being a leader in the local financial field, also holds a prominent position as a civic worker, having been associated for many years with the Georgetown Citizens' Association.

"For years," said Mr. Parris, "it has been customary in the business world, and particularly in financial circles, to couple Republican rule with business prosperity and to associate Democratic administration with hard times. This sentiment is prevalent, but based on fallacy; it is more of a sentiment than a reality."

"I do not think that the election of Hughes would assure the business man more of prosperity than would Wilson's re-election. Conversely, I believe that the re-election of Wilson will give Wall Street and the country generally as great a reign of prosperity as Hughes ever could bring about."

The reason for all this is that prosperity is not determined by the party in power, but by various other complex conditions, too intricate for analysis. A particular party may pursue policies better fitted to produce prosperity than those of another, but no one can tell in advance what particular policies a party will put into effect. Platforms mean nothing; they are scraps of paper; they are tossed aside after election time and are forgotten. This situation makes it impossible to rely upon parties in forecasting national prosperity.

"If I vote this year I shall vote for Wilson, merely because of the fact that he has kept us at peace while the rest of the world has been at war. Our present peace policy is the basis of our prosperity. This would be the sole factor in causing me to support Wilson."
