to furnishing officers' service records in the case of courtmartial proceedings, and these frequently are furnished, but the procedure must not put the department force to extra trouble.

In response to the request that National Guard organizations inform the War Department as to whether they will be able to maintain horses for their field artillery, cavalry, and Signal Corps units, should they be assigned to them, reports have been received from all the States except Kentucky, Michigan, and Pennsylvania.

As a result, orders have been issued by the War Department authorizing the assignment of 6,475 horses to various militia organizations. At the time the National Guardsmen were called into the Federal service, approximately 40,000 horses were purchased. The plan for distribution of horses among the militia organizations was suggested as a means of disposing of these animals after they have served their purpose on the border.
