MILK PRODUCERS SEEK PROBE OF SITUATION

Invite Investigation of Contentions for Higher Price for Product.

The Maryland and Virginia Milk Producers' Association, in a statement issued last night, announced that it would welcome an investigation of its organization and the condition which confronts it due to the present prices of milk.

An investigation of the conditions, either official or conducted by the business men of this city, said Manager Hooker, would soon disclose that we are justified in going to the same ends as adopted by the New York producers.

This same question came up only recently in the fight of the New York producers for increased price. State Commissioner of Foods Dillon investigated the situation and found a verdict in favor of the producer in every respect, and following the investigation he led in the fight, and was the most ardent supporter of the farmers' cause.

CABINET HEADS MOUNT STUMP FOR DEMOCRACY

Departments Left in Charge of Bureau Chiefs.

Most of the big government departments will be run by bureau chiefs and subordinate officials during the next two weeks, for the majority of President Wilson's Cabinet will be circulating through the country aiding his campaign for re-election.

Secretary of Commerce Redfield is scheduled to tour Ohio, with speeches at Cleveland and Cincinnati, then to cities in Indiana. Assistant Secretary of Labor Post has important assignments in Pennsylvania and other Eastern States, and Solicitor Thurman of the Department of Commerce, will aid the campaign in New England.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Peters will work in Massachusetts and other New England States, and Secretary of the Navy Daniels and Postmaster General Burleson will be given assignments by the Democratic National Committee.

With the exception of Secretary of State Lansing and Attorney General Gregory practically all of the Cabinet will be heard on the stump. Secretary of the Interior Lane is on the Mexican Commission, and is thus denied to the Democratic leaders for campaign purposes.

AGENT FAVORS CAPITAL AS FACTORY LOCATION

President of Mays Company Secures Local Directors.

Officials of the company will return to Washington next week and inspect the sites which have been offered, and if satisfactory terms are arranged and a property selected, building operations will begin within a short time.

No financial inducements have been offered to influence the company to locate its main plant in this city, but business men of the District have consented to serve on the directorate as evidence of their belief in the success of the new industry.

ARMENIAN RELIEF MONEY GATHERED AT 60 POINTS

Money was collected at sixty points in Washington yesterday to add to the \$2,000,000 fund being raised to purchase 4,000 tons of food supplies and charter a collier to carry them to 1,000,000 starving Armenians and Serbians in Asia Minor.

All the money taken in yesterday, together with that to be collected in all the churches of the city today, will be taken tomorrow morning to the headquarters of the local auxiliary committee, the office of Dr. M. 
