MAY DEFEY ADJACENT PRODUCERS OF MILK

Local Dealers Likely to Draw on New York and Ohio for Supply.

Rather than meet the demands of the Maryland and Virginia Milk Producers' Association a number of local dealers will import their milk from other States, according to the proprietor of the Swiss Dairy of this city.

"Some of the dealers have already taken advantage of this market," continued the Swiss Dairy official, "and in many cases they pay even more than is asked by the nearby producers, doing this rather than themselves to an agreement lasting until next May. Although the Health Department has not given these out-of-town producers a permit, the milk is still being shipped here.

"When the drivers' union was organized it meant an increase in the cost of labor of 25 per cent and a number of dealers were nearly forced out of business at the time."

BUSINESS MEN WOULD POTECT FLAG IN D. C.

A special effort will be made by the Board of Trade committee on the protection of the flag to have enacted in the coming session of Congress a law punishing the desecration or mutilation of the flag in the District.

In formulating its annual report at the meeting yesterday the committee called attention to a desecration of the flag unintentionally made by a Philadelphia publisher. The committee placed the facts in the hands of Governor Brumbaugh, who referred it to District Attorney Roun, of Philadelphia, with a result that the plate of the offending matter was destroyed.

HEAD OF G. O. P. CLUB TARGET FOR SPEAKER

E. Jackson Hilton Denounces William R. Harr Before Wilson Women.

Questioning the authenticity of William R. Harr's protestations of fidelity to the traditions of the South, E. Jackson Hilton, addressing a rally of the Women's Wilson Union in its headquarters last night, replied to a recent campaign address delivered by Mr. Harr, who is president of the Hughes Club of Washington.

Mr. Hilton's speech was a defense of the record of the administration generally. It had been planned by the union to have Secretary of War Baker as speaker, but the Secretary was unable to attend. Tomorrow night will be observed at the headquarters as West Virginia night. The Women's Wilson Association of that State will conduct the meeting and hear talks by prominent Democrats. German night is scheduled for Tuesday, when the program will include speeches in German. The German Eight-hour League will be in charge. The Women's Wilson Union headquarters, which are at Fifteenth and F streets, are open every week day from 9 o'clock in the morning to midnight.
