CARRANZA MADE GOOD, DECLARES PUBLICIST

George Miner Writes of Reforms Established in Mexico.

Let us consider Mexico as it is and as it should be. President Wilson was justified in recognizing the de facto government. Peace has now been established all over the republic, except in certain isolated sections in the north, near the American border, where bands of outlaws are more or less active, partly due to encouragement they receive from powerful interests north of the Rio Grande, who hope to bring about intervention.

Two-thirds of the country has been captured and pacified by the Carranza forces. Zapata's bands dispersed and the bandit himself driven into hiding in the mountains of Morelos, where he can do no harm. This has been accomplished by the First Chief since his recognition by Mr. Wilson, and so in that respect Carranza has made good his promise and Mr. Wilson has been justified.

The object of the revolution was to free the people of Mexico. Of its 15,000,000 inhabitants 14,000,000 had no rights whatever. Municipal elections were held all over Mexico the first week in September. It was the first time in the history of that country that there had ever been a general, free and honest election. Everywhere the peons voted. Mr. Carranza has kept his promise that he would give universal suffrage.

Active work has been in progress in the direction of agrarian reform for many months. Every Sunday there is a land distribution. Those who have had their lands stolen get them back, and those who want to work land are given a certain tract of government holdings.
