

PAPER COLLECTIONS IN SUBURBS DECLINE

Distances to Be Covered by School Children Make Volunteers Scarce.

Suburban collections of old paper under auspices of the public schools have fallen behind the collections of the schools located in the city proper. Principals of these schools have been reluctant to ask for aid because of the distances that must be covered, but volunteers are eagerly sought.

It is estimated that the children of District schools have gathered about 114,000 pounds of old paper in the two weeks of the campaign, or an average of half a pound for each child.

At this rate it is expected that \$13,000 can be raised for the playground fund during the year. While there are several other sources gathering old paper, it is believed that a good quantity is being wasted, and school children have been urged to make a special effort to get this lost portion.

\$1,000,000 IN DYES FOR U. S. MONEY ON WAY HERE

The Customs Department announced yesterday afternoon that with special permission from Great Britain, a shipment of dyes, reported to be worth \$1,000,000, was now en route to New York from Germany for use by this government in printing paper money.

The dyes were shipped through Holland and are on board the Nieu Amsterdam, Holland-American liner. Other shipments are to follow.
