

CARDINALS TO ATTEND DOMINICAN FETE HERE

Celebration Next Week to Attract High Prelates to Capital City.

The seventh centenary celebration of the Dominican Fathers, to be held next week at the College of the Immaculate Conception, Brookland, will be the most notable event in the history of the Dominican Order in the United States. Dominicans the world over are looking to the Province of St. Joseph to commemorate this anniversary in a manner worthy of the occasion. As most of the other forty provinces and congregations scattered throughout the world are suffering from the misfortunes of Europe's catastrophe.

This celebration will be the biggest ecclesiastical ceremony that has ever been witnessed in Washington. It will bring to this city the largest gathering of church dignitaries that has ever assembled here. The three American cardinals, archbishops, bishops and monsignori from all over the country are expected to be in attendance. Provincials of religious orders and congregations; mothers of congregations of nuns, and heads of the various religious communities associated with the Catholic University are among the 5,000 persons that have been invited to take part in the centenary functions. The pastors of the twenty-three Dominican parishes in various parts of the country, representatives from the provinces of the Most Holy Name, California; St. Dominic's, Canada, and the Most Holy Rosary, Philippine Islands—which has foundations in Louisiana—will be the guests of the community during the week of the celebration.

Plan Civic Celebration.

The civic celebration also promises to be the largest demonstration of its kind that has ever been held in the city. It will take place at Poll's Theater, Sunday afternoon, November 13, at 3:30 o'clock. Speakers of national reputation will be on the program. Among them are Representative John J. Fitzgerald, of Brooklyn, N. Y.; W. Bourke Cochran, of New York; Charles J. Bonaparte, of Baltimore, and William J. Kearns, of Newark, N. J.

The arrangements for the celebration are under the directions of two dominicans well known in Washington. They are Very Rev. Raymond Meagher, O. P., provincial of the Dominicans in the East, and Very Rev. E. G. Fitzgerald, O. P. Father Meagher was pastor of St. Dominic's Church, in the southwest section for a number of years, and was prominent in religious circles during that time. Father Fitzgerald is a Washingtonian. Last May he was elected prior of the Dominican House of Studies, Brookland, previous to which he had been for six years pastor of St. Vincent's Church, New York City.

On Tuesday, November 14, cardinals' day, the pontifical high mass will be celebrated by His Eminence James Cardinal Gibbons. The ministers are as follows: Assistant priest, Rev. P. C. Gavin, rector of Sacred Heart Church; deacon for the mass, Very Rev. Peter J. O'Callaghan, O. P.; superior of the Apostolic Mission House; Novice-master for the mass, Very Rev. Edward J. Strauss, O. M. I., superior of the Oblates Study House; deacons of honor, Very Rev. Godfrey Schilling, O. F. M., superior of the Franciscan Monastery of Mount St. Sepulchre, and Very Rev. Robert A. Skinner, C. S. P., superior of St. Paul's College. The master of ceremonies will be Very Rev. George A. Dougherty, D. D., vice rector of Catholic University. The sermon will be preached by the rector of Catholic University, Bishop Thomas J. Shahan, S. T. D.

WOULD CHANGE ROUTE OF PROPOSED CAR LINE

Property owners along Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets in the vicinity of Virginia avenue and B street northwest yesterday protested to the Public Utilities Commission against the proposed extension of the Capital Traction Company's lines to Potomac Park by these streets. The streets, they said, were resident streets and were not suited to street car traffic.

Daniel Callaghan, one of the protesters, suggested that the new line be run out Seventeenth street, which, he said, was better suited to the purpose and was much wider. This route was also favored by H. R. Webb, Alfred G. Gawler, Adolph Loehel and C. R. Reynolds, property owners in Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets.

DISTRICT STREAMS SHOW INCREASE IN POLLUTION

According to the annual report of Asst. E. Phillips, superintendent of sewers, an increase in the pollution of streams entering the District was noted during the past year.

It is explained that this condition was due to the installation of sewerage systems in neighboring towns which discharge their sewage into the streams flowing through the park system of the District. The reports state that this condition will be remedied.

The report shows that 21,034,000 gallons of sewage and 302,000,000 gallons of storm water were pumped during the year.

VICKERS RIFLE FAVORED

Secretary of War Baker yesterday announced that the Vickers machine rifle had been tentatively adopted by the United States as the standard rapid-fire machine gun of the Army.

Funds are available for the immediate purchase of \$2,000,000 worth of the rifles, to be equally divided between the regular army and the State militia.

The adoption of the rifle was in accordance with recommendations of the joint army-navy-civilian board of experts recently appointed to test all makes of machine guns.

The Lewis machine gun, which caused a controversy between Col. L. W. Lewis, retired, and the chief of ordnance, Gen. Crozier, previous to appointment of the board, was given second place in the recommendations.
