

BIRTH CONTROL PLAYED BY GOTHAM PHYSICIAN

Dr. Walsh Denounces Practices as Abhorrent and Decadent.

Special to The Washington Herald. New York, Nov. 18.—Denouncing "birth control" as abhorrent, Dr. James J. Walsh defined his attitude in an address delivered at an open meeting of the Woman's City Club, at the Park Avenue Hotel...

He attributed the decadence of Rome and the declination of the race of Maoris, the original inhabitants of Australia, to the restriction on children.

"What this church will not permit and constantly abhors is the use of prevention," he said.
