## POSTAL UNION ATTACKS BUREAU HEAD'S ACTION

Refusal of Director Ralph to Grant Leave Criticized in Letter.

The Brotherhood of Railway Postal Clerks is the latest organization to criticize Director J. E. Ralph, of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, for his refusal to allow J. J. Deviny, president of the Plate Printers' Union, leave of absence to attend to duties in connection with the union.

In a letter addressed to Mr. Ralph, Carl Freeman, secretary-treasurer of the brotherhood, said that his denial of the leave requested was not in accordance with the practice existing in the postal service, and that his action appeared to be an infringement on the rights of Civil Service employees' organizations.

Deviny asked for an extension of leave that he might directly petition Congress in behalf of Civil Service employees. Because he had been granted a long leave of absence for union business, his request was refused by Director Ralph.

In his letter Mr. Freeman cited several similar cases that exist in the postal department, where union officials are not obliged to report at any time during the year when it would conflict with their duties as union officials.
