WE AND DRY FORCES BUSY AMONG SOLONS

Activity of Lobbyists Brings Complaint from Senators

In the Capitol corridors and in Congressional offices yesterday, advocates of a saloonless capital and the opponents of dry forces devoted much of their time to "sounding out."

Some of the dry forces were so earnest in their buttonholing of Senators that warnings were issued by the Capitol police that members of the Senate had complained about their activities in the corridors.

Summed up, the result of the impromptu conferences tended to show: 1. That there is a majority of the House District Committee against prohibition for the District.

2. That the Rules Committee is prepared to bring out a special rule to make the Sheppard bill in order should an effort be made to bring the bill back to the floor.

3. That the efforts of the liquor forces will now be centered on having the referendum attached to the measure.

4. That the sentiment of a majority in the House favors the bill and it will be passed if it comes to a vote.

5. That opponents of the measure yesterday discussed the inauguration of a prolonged filibuster if an attempt is made to force it through at the present session.

It seems certain that the District committee will call up the Sheppard bill for a hearing directly after the hearing on the telephone bill is concluded.

That will bring the measure up for debate and will set the stage for the adjournment of the present session.

Perusal of the bill yesterday disclosed that the Senate had inadvertently left a clause in the bill which states the cause in which it was brought in effect, November 1, 1916.

The defect means that it will have to be amended by the House and November 1, 1917, substituted. Such an amendment would bring the bill back to the Senate for agreement to the House amendment and offer an opportunity for a Senate filibuster by opponents of the measure.

License holders are confident that the bill will meet an executive veto if it reached the White House without the referendum attached. The only apparent reason for this belief is an opinion expressed informally by President Wilson in a letter of three years ago in which he questioned such a veto.

Should the bill be vetoed, the opportunity should be taken to amend it.
