

CHORUS OF ONE HUNDRED REPEAT THE "MESSIAH"

Oratorio Sung in Impressive Manner by Large Chorus.

The Evening Chorus of one hundred voices under the direction of Sydney Lloyd Wrightson, repeated the "Messiah," at the Church of the Covenant yesterday evening.

The "Oratorio" which is one of the most beautiful and impressive musical compositions written, was rendered in a finished and artistic manner, the chorus singing with firmness and precision, and achieving remarkably beautiful effects. Miss Yettie Craig sustained the soprano solos. The contralto, Miss Jacobs, sang the solos "He was Despised" and "He Shall Feed His Flock" with ease and tenderness. Mr. Backing, tenor, and Mr. Tiltman, bass, were the other soloists, and were effective in their parts.

The organ prelude "Largo," the familiar "Hallelujah Chorus," the sevenfold "Amen" and the organ postlude "March" from "Judus Maccabeus," were all features that helped make it a musical triumph.

Harvey Murray was at the organ, and proved a skillful and sympathetic accompanist.

TO "FIRE" 6,000,000.

London, Jan. 15.—It is estimated that between 6,000,000 and 8,000,000 of persons now employed by the government, representing half the wage-earning population of the United Kingdom, will be discharged at the end of the war, according to the report of the committee on labor problems. All these workers will not be discharged simultaneously, but it is probable that within two months after peace has been declared some 2,000,000 or 3,000,000 workers will be turned off.
