ADMIRAL'S SALUTE PLANNED

At Hero's Request, Midshipmen Will Accompany Body to Its Final Resting Place.

With the full pomp and dignity of national honors, such as have seldom been accorded an American hero, all that is mortal of Admiral George Dewey, will be laid to rest today under the spreading oaks of the Arlington National Cemetery, after ceremonies at the Capitol, in which President Wilson, the United States Supreme Court, Congress, diplomats, and others high in official life will join in silent tribute.

100 GIRL RIOTERS PULL HAIR IN FIGHT

GRAYSON TO TRIUMPH DESPITE OPPOSITION
