CONFEDERATE CHILDREN HONOR MEMORY OF LEE

Impressive Exercises Held in Statuary Hall at Capitol.

Lee by the Mildred Lee Chapter, Children of the Confederacy, yesterday afternoon in Statuary Hall at the Capitol. The attendance was largely from the membership of various chapters of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, The Southern Society of Washington, the Southern Relief Society, and other patriotic and social organizations from the South.

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe yesterday was authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission to establish rates on ammunition from the St. Louis manufacturing district to Gulf ports for export equalling those to New York. The change is expected to help relieve the car shortage.

The funeral of Mrs. Alice C. Mixer, wife of Charles H. Mixer, of the Pension Office, who died at Chevy Chase Sanitarium Wednesday, was held yesterday at Glenwood Cemetery.

Capt. Augustus U. Dunning, Fifth Infantry, National Guard of New Jersey, will leave to be an officer tomorrow for conduct prejudicial to good order and military discipline.

The California oil lands leasing controversy was taken to President Wilson yesterday afternoon. Secretaries Maguire, of the navy, and Lane, of the Interior and Attorney General Gregory conferred with the President at the White House in an effort to find a common ground for agreement.

Germany has withdrawn the charges of violating neutrality looked against C. J. Vopicka, American Minister, whose presence in Bucharest, according to a cable from Ambassador Gerard.

A naval militia of 2,000 instead of 9,800 is the aim of a campaign launched yesterday by Capt. Thomas F. Magruder, chief of the division of naval militia affairs. No State at this time is recruited to its maximum strength in this service.

LONG WATER SURVEY.

San Francisco, Jan. 19.—It will take 503 years to make a complete survey of the waters of Alaska, California, Washington and Oregon, according to estimates made by Supt. E. Lester Jones, of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey.

The estimates are based on progress made with the present facilities. It will take 532 years to complete the survey of Alaska water, and 170 years to chart the waters of Washington, Oregon and California, he says.

PICKETS TAKE RECESS TO HONOR DEAD HERO

"Silent Sentinels" Off Duty at White House Until Monday.

No suffragist pickets will be on duty before the gates of the White House today, according to Miss Alice Paul, leader of the banner-bearing brigade. The cessation of regular sentinel duty has been ordered in solemn respect to the late Admiral Dewey.

The pickets will not return to duty until Monday morning, but Commander-in-Chief Paul declared they would march to their posts bright and early on that day to renew their watchful, waiting policy.

Tuesday is expected to be a red letter day. A small army of Pennsylvania suffragists will line up in front of the White House and flaunt suffrage battle flags before any who may believe that the present campaign is on the wane. The Pennsylvania delegation have equipped themselves with a regular uniform for sentry duty and it is believed they will create a mild sensation when they appear on the Avenue.
