PRESIDENT'S PEACE NOTE IS INDORSED

Pacifists' Meeting Commends His Statesmanship—Pass Resolutions.

The President's last peace note was warmly commended by President George W. Kirshway, of the American Peace Society, presiding over the meeting held yesterday at the Raleigh Hotel. A number of important resolutions were adopted and entered on the records of the society. Some of these are: "The American Peace Society heartily commends the wise and statesmanlike action of the President of the United States in appealing to the nations at war to define the objects for which they are continuing the fearful struggle."

NEAR-PANIC IN HOSPITAL.

New York, Jan. 20.—A spectacular fire, fed with intermittent and explosions, destroyed the Manhattan Brass Foundry in East Twenty-eighth street today, injured three firemen and created a near-panic in Bellevue Hospital, a block away. Four alarms were turned in, calling out all the fire-fighting apparatus between Fifty-ninth and Great Jones streets. The damage was estimated at \$100,000.

DEEMS FEE TOO LARGE; HE SENDS BACK \$2,500 Cleveland, Jan. 20.—Can you imagine a young man of 29 indignantly refusing a check for \$2,500? That's what Thomas L. Sidlo, law partner of Secretary of War Baker, and former service director of Cleveland, did. Sidlo was the city's arbitrator in the car power contract hearings in which the municipal light plant and the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company were bidding for the contract to supply power to run the city street car system. The railway company chose Warren Bicknell as its arbitrator. The city chose Sidlo. Sidlo and Bicknell chose A. F. Ingersoll as the third man. Ingersoll and Bicknell threw out the municipal light plant's bid and voted for an eighteen-year contract with the private concern. Sidlo turned in a dissenting report. The company then mailed checks for \$5,000 as fees to the arbitrators. Ingersoll and Bicknell kept theirs. Sidlo thought \$500 was ample compensation and sent \$2,500 back with a request that it be placed in the interest fund—the fare barometer.

UNIVERSITY CLUB TO WELCOME EXPLORERS

Capt. Amundsen and Capt. Bartlett Will Be Guests Tomorrow.

The University Club will be the host Monday night to two of the world's most famous explorers—Capt. Roald Amundsen, of Norway, who discovered the South Pole, and Capt. Robert A. Bartlett, who was chief navigator in the Peary expedition that reached the North Pole. This will be the first public appearance in

Washington of Capt. Bartlett and the first of Capt. Amundsen during his present visit to this country. Capt. Amundsen and Capt. Bartlett are now busily engaged in preparing for the expeditions which they will lead next year into the Polar region, their purpose being to explore the unknown million of square miles which lie within the Arctic circle north of Alaska and Siberia. The club plans to make the affair a notable occasion. Many distinguished guests, both American and Norwegian, will be present, among them being

Col. M. M. Parker, president of the club; Capt. Amundsen, the Minister from Norway, and Mrs. Bryn, Capt. Bartlett, Mrs. Robert E. Perry, Mr. F. Herman Gade, Norwegian Consul at Chicago, and Mrs. Gade, Dr. O. H. Tittmann, president of the National Geographic Society, and Mrs. Tittmann, Maj. Gen. A. W. Greely and Mrs. Greely. Claude N. Bennett will preside. In connection with this occasion Monday night has been designated as "Ladies' Night" and ladies, accompanied by members of the club, will be admitted.
