K. of P. Order Acquires Three-Story Brick Building for Remodeling.

Alexandria, Va., Feb. 9.—A new home has just been purchased by Oriental Lodge, No. 6, Knights of Pythias. They have acquired from Fred L. Wagar and others a three-story brick structure on the north side of Cameron street, between Royal and Fairfax streets, formerly known as the El Dorado house.

HOUSEWIFE'S DAILY ECONOMY CALENDAR

A Bottle of Grape Juice.

By FRANCES MARSHALL. Grape juice is one of those reliable stand-bys for which every cook and housewife is thankful. For it can be kept always on hand, and it is as sure to give good results in one sort of weather as in another.

Grape juice also is made in this way: Wash a cupful of sugar and soak it overnight in three cupfuls of cold water. In the morning cook it in a double boiler until it is clear and transparent. Mix a cupful of granulated sugar with a cupful of grape juice and add this mixture to the hot sugar. Cool it and pour it in sherbert cups and then chill it on the ice.

Jelly is made in this way from grape juice: Soak a tablespoonful of gelatin in a little cold water until it is soft and then add half a cupful of boiling water. When the gelatin is dissolved add a tablespoonful of lemon juice, a quarter of a cupful of sugar and a cupful of grape juice. Pour it into a mould and harden it on the ice. Serve it with whipped cream.

Grape juice sherbet is easily made and is as refreshing as lemon sherbet. To make it, boil a quart of water with two cupfuls of sugar for twenty minutes. Add two cupfuls of grape juice and the juice of a plump lemon. Dissolve a heaping tablespoonful of powdered gelatin in a cupful of cold water and add it to the other ingredients. Cool the mixture and strain it and then freeze it.

Another way to make grape juice sherbet is to prepare the various ingredients in the same way but to omit the gelatin and the cupful of cold water in which it was dissolved in the previous recipe. Instead, when the sherbet is hard enough so that it is stiff to remove the dasher, stir in the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs. Serve this sherbet in cups with a teaspoonful of whipped cream on each cupful.
