CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE. union and to the loyal employees of the company. The latter have been subjected to persistent abuse, persecution, and intimidation, and the performance of their duties surrounded daily with petty annoyances.

PROMOTES DISLOYALTY.

"The Union made a vain effort to disrupt our Relief Association, which has disbursed \$34,000 in death benefits and more than \$100,000 in sick benefits since its organization, in addition to conducting other activities for the mutual benefit of its members."

TERMS OF CONTRACT.

The agreement signed with the Capital Traction Company, which ends the differences between the employees and the company, and which the employees desire to have the Washington Railway and Electric Company accept, reads:

"Memorandum of agreement by and between the Capital Traction Company, its successors and assigns, hereinafter, for convenience, called the company, and the first part, and those of its employees who are now, or may hereafter become, members of Division 688, of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America, hereinafter, for convenience, called the association, party of the second part, witnesseth:

"That in the operation of the properties of the party of the first part, both parties agree hereto as follows: "Section 1.—The purpose of this agreement is to provide the best and most satisfactory service to the public, to provide the best possible working conditions for the men, and at the same time having due regard for the economical operation of the company's properties.

"Section 2.—It is hereby agreed that properly accredited officers of the company shall meet and treat with properly accredited committees or officers of the association, who may be employees of the company, or general officers of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America, on all questions of grievance covered by sections 4 to 30, inclusive, of a proposed agreement submitted by said association on February 23, 1917, and on all questions and grievances which may arise in the future, and should there be any questions or grievances that cannot be amicably adjusted by said conferences, the same shall be submitted to the Commissioners of the District of Columbia, acting as a board of arbitration, the decision of which board shall be submitted in writing to the company and to the association, and shall be binding upon both parties hereto, provided that with respect to sections 4 to 30, inclusive, of the proposed agreement above referred to, conferences shall begin Saturday, March 10, and be held daily, Sunday excepted, until and including Wednesday, March 14. If at the expiration of such conferences no agreement has been reached on any or all of the questions included in sections 4 to 30 of said proposed agreement, above referred to, the same shall be forthwith submitted to the Commissioners of the District of Columbia, acting as a board of arbitration, the decision of which board shall be binding upon both parties, provided, further, that any wage increases which may be granted by said conferences or arbitration shall be effective as of March 11, 1917; provided, further, that any agreement reached or referred to in the aforesaid sections 4 to 30, inclusive, which may be agreed upon by conference or as a result of arbitration, as provided, shall become and remain a part of this agreement.

"Section 3.—It is further agreed that all matters concerning grievances of employees of the company when considered by the above mentioned division 688 of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America, shall be considered and acted on solely by those members of said division who are employees of the Capital Traction Company.

"Section 4.—There shall be no discrimination exercised by or against any employees by either party hereto because of the membership or nonmembership in the association.
