TELLS HOW LUSITANIA STEAMED TO HER DOOM

Disaster Plotted Here, Writer Says in "America Entangled."

The people of the United States have refused to believe that anything so fantastic as the German propaganda could be attempted by a sane people in a practical age. President Wilson's revelation of the Mexican plot was a bolt out of the blue; and now John Price Jones' story of how German agents in New York City plotted the destruction of the steamship Lusitania lays bare more of the underground conspiracy. "America Entangled" is a revealing book on the German spies in America by John Price Jones, published today.

The story which Mr. Jones sets forth in one of the chapters of his book is to the effect that Germany had tried for months to capture the Lusitania. The people in Berlin finally agreed that it was practically impossible to chase and torpedo the Lusitania, and accordingly directed agents in New York to see to it that the Lusitania went along a sea lane where U-boats would be stationed in advance to get her.

Three of Germany's agents working in New York planned the details by which the message which the British admiralty always sent the captain of the Lusitania as to his course was intercepted and the British Isles was to be stolen and a fake message substituted.

The German agents, the book says, arranged the course of the "Lusitania" on her last voyage, and had the U-boat commanders to their positions and then at the critical moment, when Capt. Turner, of the "Lusitania," asked for instructions, sent him a message through the Sayville wireless station.

Mr. Jones' book, which goes into the various ramifications of German spies in America, has a prefatory letter from Col. Theodore Roosevelt, who says that the book should be in the hands of all American citizens.

The book has two chapters devoted to the activities of Capt. Franz von Papen, recalled German military attaché, showing how Capt. von Papen plotted the destruction of railroads and canals in Canada and how a pacifist was in schemes to start war between Mexico and the United States. It devotes a chapter to Capt. Karl Boy-Ed's work in provisioning cruisers and in seeking to arouse Mexican sentiment against the United States.
