DEMANDS DEPORTATION OF STRIKEBREAKERS

Head of Federal Union Calls on Police to Oust "Gunmen." H. M. McLarin, of the Federal Employees' Union, made a demand upon the District Commissioners yesterday for the deportation of strikebreakers.

Herewith are excerpts from the statement of the director of public safety before the convention of the American Federation of Labor at Baltimore last November, showing vividly what he regards as the proper method of dealing with such a situation as that with which Washington is now confronted.

Mr. Frank Monahan, Chief of Police, Jersey City, N. J., said: "It has been my firm conviction for a long time that the majority of so-called 'strikebreakers' are notorious gunmen and ex-convicts who have no regard for human life, and who, without the slightest provocation, use the weapons in their possession to maim and kill innocent citizens."

KING REMAINS FIRM AS STRIKE CONTINUES

Will Maintain Original Position; Railway Head Declares. President Clarence P. King and the Washington Railway and Electric Company still maintain their original position, refusing to recognize Division No. 68 of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America, of which organization the striking carmen are members.

"So it is with this carmen's union. We are going to crush the diseased spot before it spreads over our entire system. Our company would be as false to its faithful employees as it would be untrue to the public and itself if it submitted to any such demands as are proposed by the union."

Mr. King commented upon certain clauses in the correspondence between a committee of the union, Commissioner Oliver P. Newman and other arbitrators. "One of these communications concluded: 'And we feel that your commission should appreciate the situation that confronts us, and not hold us responsible for suspending work when to remain longer in the service would mean the complete demoralization and destruction of our union.'"

Deaf Discharges. "Here the union admits that it will lose by the men who stay as well as by remaining in the employ of our company," declared Mr. King. "Another clause reads that if some proposition could not be arrived at before the expiration of the present contract, we fear that it will not be possible for us to restrain the employees of this company from suspending work."

Mr. King commented upon certain clauses in the correspondence between a committee of the union, Commissioner Oliver P. Newman and other arbitrators.
