Start Inspection. The press representatives, accompanied by C. B. Reed, Walter Rutledge, and William J. O'Brien, of the Washington Detective Bureau, Incorporated, with others in charge of the strikebreakers, left the Occidental Hotel at 10 o'clock last night in two automobiles.

Stop in Midst of Throng. Arriving at the car barns the automobiles stopped in the midst of a dense throng of strikers and sympathizers. The party made its way to a door, which was locked. Several raps by Mr. Reed and a guard opened.

Beaten and Locked Up. Mr. Lynn had been arrested and locked up in Georgetown, where he was operating one of the company's cars. He explained how he had been punched on the head and in the back of the neck and kicked in the stomach and then arrested for disorderly conduct.

bles distributed at all car barns and other points whose only duty is to carry detectives of the Washington Detective Bureau to police precinct stations to call out any of their men who may be arrested.

Continue Tour. The company's guests continued their tour and nearly fell over a pile of junk in the middle of the large office. On this pile were wickets, spikes, hammer heads and iron and steel of every imaginable description.

Could Feed 1,000 Men. The next scene was not unlike the 30 Ranch Wild West show. It was the kitchen department of the company, which had sprung up in six hours. It took just that time to outfit a complete kitchen and stock it with provisions to feed 1,000 men a day, if necessary.

Complete Organization. There was one thing which impressed the observer. This was the complete organization which these three men had among their strikebreakers. Still another thing in evidence was the discipline. There is very little police language used in the handling of the men.

From the east car barns the party visited all of the other barns of the company. At each barn a gauntlet of jeering strikers was run and the automobiles were dented by several missiles which were thrown.

Mass Meeting Planned. Officials of the union met the executive board of the Washington Central Labor Union and arranged for a public mass meeting on Sunday. The meeting was held at 603 Fifth street northwest. The time and place of the meeting will be determined today.

Trio Ask Police for Aid—Allege Company Is Not Treating Men Right. Strikebreakers are quitting by the score, according to a report received last night at police headquarters. Members of the crew of makeshift railings last night appealed to the police for assistance in securing transportation back to New York, whence they were imported by the detective agency which is handling the situation.

OLD EMPLOYEE ARRESTED

Henry W. Lynn, 46 years old, 516 Sixteenth street southeast, a motorman employed by the Washington Railway and Electric Company, yesterday was arrested by Policeman W. J. O'Neill at the car pit, Thirty-sixth street and Prospect avenue. He was charged with being disorderly. Lynn was later released on collateral furnished by the railway representatives. Mr. Lynn, who is one of the old employees of the company, did not get out on the strike. He yesterday became engaged at the crowd who jeered him while he was operating his car.

SIDELIGHTS ON CAR STRIKE

"Keep an eye out for a man on a motorcycle," reads a report which was yesterday received at police headquarters. "He is Jack, the Car-wrecker King," according to the statements of the police. It is alleged he had devised a scheme for causing the Washington Railway and Electric Company trouble. "Jack," it is said, gets near a vacant spot on the track, stops his "steed," and to all appearances adjusts the carburetor. In fact he thrusts into the slot between the rails obstructions for pulling plows of street cars.

Whitford was appointed to confer with President King, of the Washington Railway and Electric Company, and union officials with the view of getting them to submit their differences to the Commissioners of the District for settlement.
