

**GERMANY PREPARING
NEW PEACE MOVEMENT**

Teuton Envoys at Hague Sound Neutral Attitude on Plan.

(By the International News Service.) London, March 21.—Germany is preparing for another peace move. This is the gist of a dispatch from The Hague printed in the London Times today.

According to the telegram, German envoys are at the Dutch capital, seeking to learn how the United States and other neutrals would view another peace attempt by Germany.

Germany, it is said, is prepared to lean favorably toward some general scheme of autonomy for the races of Europe, particularly in regard to Austria-Hungary. At the same time, it is believed, Germany is prepared to make political concessions to her own people.

The delegates bear passports issued by the German foreign office.
