

YOUR WEDDING DAY And the Famous Men and Women Who Have Shared It. By MARY MARSHALL.

April 28—Stewart Edward White and Elizabeth Grant; William R. Hearst and Millicent Wilson; David Bispham and Caroline Russell.

The names of three well-known American men are found on the wedding day calendar for April 28—Stewart Edward White, best known, perhaps, as the author of "The Blazed Trail" and other tales of the wilderness; William Randolph Hearst, probably the most influential single newspaper publisher in the country; and David Bispham, who has the reputation of being the greatest of American baritone singers.

Stewart Edward White was married thirteen years ago when he was forty-four years old. His bride was Elizabeth Grant of Newport, Rhode Island. Mr. White is a very diligent worker, and the year of his marriage he put three books through the publisher—"The Silent Places," "The Mountains," and "Blazed Trail Stories."

William Randolph Hearst was married fourteen years ago to Millicent Wilson, daughter of George H. Wilson. Mr. Hearst was forty years old when he was married, and needless to say was already very widely known as a newspaper publisher.

David Bispham, the most noted of American baritone, was married thirty-two years ago today to Caroline Russell, daughter of Gen. Charles A. Russell, of Philadelphia. At the time of their marriage neither dreamed of the fame that Mr. Bispham would attain as a singer. To be sure he was a well-known amateur, but at the time of the marriage he was in the wool business. Later he was a broker and it was not till comparatively late in life that he took up singing as a profession.

For several years apparently the Bisphams were very happy. Mrs. Bispham was a very pretty woman, "fragile and very English in appearance" in spite of the fact that she, like David Bispham, was a native of Philadelphia. Fifteen years ago, after a married life of seventeen years, came the first publication of trouble in the Bispham household. Mr. Bispham brought divorce proceedings at that time, but the war was impending, and as much as possible because of the aversion that the noted singer had for notoriety of a personal sort.

Measures to cope with the destruction of hospital ships by German submarines will be among the first questions taken up by the British and French commissions.

Great Britain is to decrease the number of hospital ships and thus minimize the risk. In order to do that it will be necessary to establish greater facilities for caring for greater quantities of allied wounded in France instead of caring for them across the channel.

American surgeons and nurses will have to be added to the hospital units now in France as well as larger quantities of hospital material. Plans for accomplishing this will be taken up at once.
