ALLIES WINNING WAR, SAYS LLOYD-GEORGE

Ten Germans Held for Every British Prisoner, Premier Declares. (By the International News Service.) London, April 27.—The allies are winning the war, Premier Lloyd-George declared in a speech at Guild Hall today. Up to June, 1915, British forces had lost only eighty-four guns, said the premier, and since that time not one has been captured from the English by the German allies. Since June, 1915, the British have captured 400 guns from the Germans.

WOULD HAVE GERMAN TEXT BOOKS DROPPED

Dr. de Kerlo, Psychologist, Wants English and French Authors Used. Dr. W. de Kerlo, translator-editor of "Our Hidden Forces," in an interesting lecture at the Hotel Lafayette last night, on the subject, "The Psychology of the Hands," made an appeal for the discarding of German textbooks on psychology in use in the United States, and asked that they be replaced with books written by French and English scientists, "as a matter of patriotic loyalty."

NORWEGIAN SHIP SEIZED

Christians, April 27.—The Norwegian steamer Haarfagre has been captured by the Germans and taken into a German port, says a dispatch to the Naval Herald today. The vessel was bound from this city to Denmark, it was stated. Two more Norwegian ships have been sunk by German submarines. They were the Steg and Este.

SCANDINAVIAN CHIEFS TO MEET

Copenhagen, April 27.—Another conference of the Scandinavian premiers is to be held at Stockholm on May 10 to 11. The changes brought about in the international situation by the intervention of the United States in the war will be considered.

French Commission to Pay Round of Visits in U. S.

The French war commission, headed by Marshal Joffre and M. Viviani, will visit other American cities before concluding their stay in America. This was definitely decided today. "We came over expecting to stay twelve or fourteen days and then return," said M. Hovelacque, minister of public instruction in France, today. "But we have received stacks and stacks of telegrams from all parts of the country urging that we visit there before returning."

PROSPECTIVE WEDDING ENDS; BRIDEGROOM UNDER ARREST

Joseph Hall, aged 22, from Catlett, Va., was yesterday arrested by Detective Sergeant Charles A. Evans, of the headquarters squad, on an indictment returned by United States Grand Jury, charging perjury. It is alleged that on April 4, last, Hall in company with Miss Mary Dotson, aged 15, of Catlett, Va., appeared at the marriage license clerk's office and demanded a license. Hall, it is charged, swore that the girl was 18 years of age. The marriage was interrupted by the father of the girl.

GERMANS PUSH PEACE PLANS

Amsterdam, April 27.—Two Socialist members of the German Reichstag have arrived here to further the movement for a separate peace with Russia. They are Philip Seidenman and Dr. Edward David. It is understood that they will go from here to Stockholm to meet Russian Socialists. A Socialist conclave is to be held in Stockholm shortly.

GERMANY FAMINE-STRIKEN; STRIKES REPORTED SPREADING

Stockholm, April 27.—Germany is famine-stricken. Workers are not given enough food to keep them in health, according to press dispatches received here today. The newspaper Dagens Nyheter says that strikes in Germany are spreading, despite reports to the contrary. It is indicated that the labor troubles may affect Germany's military situation.

SEGREGATION ORDINANCES BEFORE U. S. SUPREME COURT

Before the United States Supreme Court yesterday the legality of negro segregation ordinances was re-argued upon a test case brought by colored residents of Louisville, Ky. Louisville established residence zones for whites and blacks and it is contended by the colored complainants that such segregation constitutes a violation of the constitution which provides for no discrimination on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.
