Allies and Germany Forced To Co-operate in Trading

Must Recognize Enemy After War in Spite of Plans to Kill Her Commercially, Economist Declares.

Paris, June 12 (by mail).—Since the economic conference of the allies held in Paris in the spring of this year, the economic policy of every one of the entente countries has undergone a profound change. The effect of the decisions decided upon at the conference was in brief, to make the allied countries (in which the United States and Rumania were not then included) into a restricted trading family. All outside nations, neutral as well as enemy were to be treated as on a different basis by England, France, Russia and Italy, and very careful measures were elaborated with the object of annihilating the central empire in the commercial and industrial fields during their defeat on the battlefield.
