New York, Aug. 22.—Emperor Charles Francis, the young ruler of Austria-Hungary, is setting the pace for peace in the central empires.

Ever since the Russian revolution he has taken the reins in hand for peace, or general peace, and Germany has been compelled to follow.

The center of negotiations with Russia has been Vienna, not Berlin, as generally supposed. He has shown that he is continuing to show an independence of Berlin in putting his own views through that has been rather surprising to the Germans.
