

BIG SHIPBILT GOES IN BILL

House Incorporates Amendment for \$635,000,000 for Construction.

Evidently feeling that the House, and the rest of the country, does not know just exactly where Uncle Sam is financially, Representative Swager Sherley, yesterday gave some sidelights on the urgent deficiencies appropriation now pending.

"Of a total appropriation of \$1,067,000,000, and assuming that the deficit we now contemplate of \$2,500,000,000 is met by bond issue and not by additional taxation," he pointed out, "the percentage of revenues raised by taxation to the total is 35 per cent. always excluding bond issues to provide funds for loans to allies, is 35 per cent.

Representative Sherley then went on to show how the 35 per cent compares with taxation by the allies.

"In England, the percentage raised by taxation was 26 per cent he said; in France, 14.5 per cent; in Germany, 14.5 per cent; in Canada, 8 per cent."

Despite the fact that this country raises more money by taxation than any of the allies, legislators must not forget, Mr. Sherley said, to continue the policy.

Turning to some of the larger items of expense, Mr. Sherley said: "The vast sum of \$1,000,000,000 carried in this bill are due to two or three main causes. First, we are enlarging the building program for ships enormously. We had authorized a program that contemplated an expenditure of less than \$1,000,000,000. We are now authorizing a program that contemplates finally an expenditure little short of \$2,000,000,000.

"The ordinance people came with estimates that ran up to something like \$1,750,000,000. Part of that was represented in an increased need for equipment for the million men, not anticipated at the time the first estimates were submitted. Of course, the larger part of it was due to making provision for the equipment of a second million men."

House passed the amendment adding \$635,000,000 to the bill for the shipbuilding program. This amendment adds \$200,000,000 for finishing ships now under construction; \$250,000,000 for new ships, \$150,000,000 for the purchase of ships; \$250,000,000 for the building of yards and plants to produce vessels. It passed from that amendment to another adding \$338,000 to the State Department budget.

Thereafter, discussion degenerated into a wrangle which consumed most of the afternoon. It was opened by Sisson, of Mississippi, who brought up again the question of a war expenditures committee to supervise expenditures by the executive departments. Chairman Fitzgerald and Minority Leader Gillett had agreed the question was not to be brought up at this time.

So little progress was made today and so urgent are the needs for more money, that Chairman Fitzgerald then put through a gag rule to rush the bill Monday.

Edward T. Taylor Calls Attention to Bills Recently Introduced.

Congressman Edward T. Taylor has written President Sinclair of the Chamber of Commerce, calling attention to his bills, H. R. 5378 and H. R. 5379, to authorize the reuse of containers of tobacco or snuff, etc. Mr. Sinclair has had this referred at once to the Committee on Law and Legislation with a request for immediate report. Congressman Taylor's letter was inspired by the story in The Herald that a committee had been appointed by the Chamber to look into the matter of conservation of old tin, along the lines of the paper-saving contest inaugurated some months since.

PARADISE—WHAT OF THE SPIRITS IN PRISON?

WE BELIEVE THAT THROUGH THE ATONEMENT OF CHRIST, ALL MANKIND MAY BE SAVED, BY OBEDIENCE TO THE LAWS AND ORDINANCES OF THE GOSPEL.

No limitation is here expressed with respect to the living but the few just dead tabernacled in mortal bodies, destined sooner or later to die? Who are the dead but the uncounted myriads who once lived in the world of the disembodied? If the Atonement accomplished by the Lord Jesus Christ be a means of salvation to the few only who constituted the living just, some specific period, or even to all who have heard and accepted the Gospel while in the body, the sacrifice made by the Son of God becomes of limited and small effect. The word of Scripture declares otherwise.

Christ affirmed that His mission as the Redeemer and Savior of the race extended beyond the grave. Consider the profound significance of His words: "VERILY, I SAY UNTO YOU, THE HOUR IS COMING, AND NOW IS, WHEN THE DEAD SHALL HEAR THE VOICE OF THE SON OF GOD, AND THEY THAT HEAR SHALL LIVE." (John 5:25.) "MANY THAT ARE IN THE GRAVES SHALL HEAR HIS VOICE, AND SHALL COME FORTH; THEY THAT HAVE DONE GOOD, UNTO THE RESURRECTION OF LIFE; AND THEY THAT HAVE DONE EVIL, UNTO THE RESURRECTION OF DAMNATION." Daniels Bans High Art Tattooing on Person of Sailors.

Old seamen, and others, wishing to enter the navy, who are so unfortunate as to have "Little Egypt" tattooed on their persons wearing smiles, only, are having lots of trouble getting them properly groomed so that they will be acceptable for service in the navy, under the latest ruling of Secretary Daniels.

Following the Secretary's ruling, tattoo artists opened "studios" throughout the country under the supervision and maintenance of the Navy League. But owing to the present "bad blood" between Mr. Daniels and the League, these shops have been closed. All because he intimated that the Navy Department didn't need the assistance of the League any longer.

The shops opened by the Navy League were fitting the latest in tattooed gowns to the girls on the arms of the sailors, and were doing it free of charge. Now the aspirants to the navy, who happen to wear the banned decorations will have to turn elsewhere to have them dressed for company, besides paying for their palms.

Drawings of the women are the only designs placed under the ban by Mr. Daniels, but practically every design known to sailors is included. Had his order been to drop from the navy enlisted men wearing tattooings which are in bad taste, in his estimation, there would hardly be enough men left in the navy to keep the forward watch, in the opinion of those familiar with the navy.
