

PATRIOTISM AT MASONS' DINNER

Annual Scottish Rite Affair Draws Four Hundred Members.

Addressing about 400 Scottish Rite Masons of the District, assembled at the Ebbitt Hotel last night at their annual banquet, the Rev. Dr. Diamond paid a warm tribute to the newspapers of the United States for their patriotism.

Judge Arthur B. Hayes acted as toastmaster, introducing the speakers after the dinner which was served beginning at 8 o'clock. First on the program was a toast to the government of the United States followed by a pledge of allegiance to the Scottish Rite, and another to the Sovereign Grand Commander, George Fleming Moore, who was prevented from being present by other duties.

Rev. Dr. Diamond, pastor of St. Andrews Episcopal Church, said that all loyal citizens must give their minds as well as their hearts to the real issue at stake, as outlined so clearly in President Wilson's reply to the Pope's last proposal for peace.

"Realize that as you are citizens and Masons you have your part to fulfill," he concluded. In a toast drunk to the Masons of the District, Deputy Grand Master Lem Towers emphasized the close relations between lodges situated here, and the spirit of unity which binds them together.

Men in uniform were asked to stand while the toastmaster paid them a glowing tribute. At the conclusion of the speech-making, the entire company rose and joined in singing "The Star Spangled Banner" and "Auld Lang Syne."

The police think she had some religious theory to present to the President. Miss Bower was sent to the Washington Asylum Hospital for treatment.

Police headquarters sent a telegram to her parents, John and Emma Bower, last night, but stated that they expected no answer till this morning.

Capital Camera Club Secures Cooperation of Chamber of Commerce.

Odenthal, editor of the Capital Camera Club, who has charge of the club and educational lecture bureau of the club, conceived the idea of making these lectures and travelogues free to the public. The idea was placed before Thomas Grant, of the Chamber of Commerce, and a program laid out. The first of these free entertainments will be held at the room of the Chamber of Commerce, Twelfth and F streets, on Thursday, October 11, at 8 p. m.

In this exhibition there will be about seven feet of stirring war films showing the official French, British and Belgian government pictures taken by their own photographers. This will give the public an idea of what the modern motion picture photographer has to contend with in modern warfare.

Federation of Citizens' Associations May Double Membership.

Revision of the constitution, which may double the full membership of the Federation of Citizens' Association, was considered last night at the meeting of the association in the board room of the District Building.

In committee on the whole, with Vice President George A. Russell, of Park View, in the chair, it was decided to change the representation of the different local associations from a delegate to two delegates. This change will mean that two members of each associational member of the larger body will be delegated to the call of his provision in J. H. Crawford, of the Connecticut Avenue Citizens' Association, who favored the adoption of an amendment to the constitution to increase the number of the members in the subordinate association.

Referred to Committee. Final revision of the constitution was re-referred to the committee on revision of the constitution which will be vested with the deciding powers. They will meet in the office of Charles S. Shreve, president of the committee to discuss the proposed amendments, on Wednesday, October 10, at 8 p. m.

A committee was appointed to draw up a resolution of appreciation for the services rendered the association by a retiring member, D. A. Edwards, who made public his intention of leaving last night. The chair appropriated George W. Evans, D. A. Crawford, and G. H. Russell, on the committee to discuss the proposed amendments. Mr. Edwards is resigning after refusing to serve his tenth term as president of the Lincoln Park Citizens' Association, and the same term as delegate to the Federated Citizens' Association.

Resolution passed at the last meeting of the North Capitol and Eckington Citizens' Association, advocating the adoption of a standard pound or broad, weighing either one pound or a multiple of a pound, a municipal dairy and a municipal market was adopted by the committee on public health.

Italy Directs Law Against Pacifists. Provides Penalties for Efforts to Suppress Spirits of People.

Rome, Oct. 6.—Italy has struck a strong blow at the anti-war propagandists who have been carrying on a campaign for peace. A law has just been enacted providing new penalties for any person "attempting in any way to decrease the public spirit and thus diminish the power of resolution of Italy."

The law is the consequence of the unpatriotic actions of some of the extreme socialists. It is viewed as Italy's declaration of her intention to prosecute the war with the utmost energy.

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
