

STOPS COMBINED SALES OF SUGAR AND GROCERIES

Food Administration Will Punish Washington Dealers Disobeying Order.

All combination sales of food commodities are forbidden under an order issued by the Food Administration, effective yesterday, with one exception. The sale of sugar in combination with cornmeal at the rate of one pound of sugar with two pounds of cornmeal is the only combination sale of foodstuffs dealers are permitted to make.

To Punish Violators.
The sale of one or more food commodities upon condition that the purchaser shall buy one or more other food commodities from the seller is regarded by the Food Administration as a combination sale, a statement declared, and all violations of the order will be dealt with sharply.

Whether the combination sale of sugar with cornmeal will become a general practice among the grocers of Washington is not known, but one result of the order, officials expect, will be to increase the amount of cornmeal consumed. Combination sales are regarded, the statement said, as a wasteful practice, and the exception made for cornmeal and sugar was made as a wheat conservation measure, though the sale of either commodity in conjunction with the other is not required.

The statement making the order effective was given out last night by Clarence R. Wilson, Federal food administrator for the District of Columbia.

Official Order.
It follows:
"On and after this date, November 17, 1917, all combination sales of food commodities are forbidden, with the exception stated below.

"The sale of one or more food commodities upon condition that the purchaser shall buy one or more other food commodities from the seller is regarded as a combination sale. "Combination sales are regarded as a wasteful practice within the meaning of Section 4 of the food administration act, approved August 19, 1917, because they frequently result in the sale of more foodstuff than the particular purchaser would ordinarily buy.

"Until further notice and as a wheat conservation measure, the dealer may sell sugar in combination with corn meal at the rate of one pound of sugar with two pounds of corn meal. No other combination will be permitted nor will any other ratio than that here stated be allowed. "The dealer shall not sell either sugar or corn meal at a price yielding him a profit greater than he has normally enjoyed upon the particular commodity.

"The dealer is not required to make combination sales of sugar and corn meal, but may do so at his discretion. "This ruling will be strictly enforced throughout the District of Columbia and cases of its infraction should be promptly reported to Clarence R. Wilson, Federal Food Administrator for the District of Columbia, 1429 K street, northwest.

GETS COURT WRIT TO FREE PICKETS

Militants' Counsel Acts in Federal Court at Richmond.

Matthew E. O'Brien, counsel for the militant suffragettes yesterday sent out a writ of habeas corpus in the District Court at Richmond, Va., for the release of thirty White House pickets confined in the District workhouse at Occoquan.

Judge Edmund A. Waddill, Jr. made the writ returnable at the court house in Alexandria November 27. The release of the pickets is sought upon the ground of illegal arrest and cruel and inhuman treatment. Secretary of War Baker turned a deaf ear to the plea of a delegation from Cameron House who urged him to investigate conditions at the reformatory. The committee consisted of Mrs. Gilson Gardner, Mrs. William Kent, Mrs. M. Toscan Bennett, Mrs. Robert Walker, Mrs. John Branham and Miss Katherine Morey. The Secretary bluntly informed them he had no time for an inquiry and referred them to Attorney General Gregory.

Through the agency of a friend, Miss Lucy Burns, who is serving a six months sentence at Occoquan, sent word that under no consideration would she run for Congress in New York. The use of her name by the New York suffragette as a candidate, was unauthorized, she said.

20 POLICEMEN POSE FOR MOVIE MACHINE

Demonstrate Art of Resuscitation and First Aid.

With the palm strewn gardens of the Pan American building for a setting, twenty husky guardians of the District's law yesterday morning were photographed for a leading movie corporation, while demonstrating the art of resuscitation and first aid treatment to drowning persons.

Field Agent Longfellow, of the Boy Scouts of America, Maj. Raymond W. Fullman, of the Police Department, and other officials watched the movie man grind into celluloid record the acts of the District policemen.

Much the same series of maneuvers were performed as those which occupied the attention of audiences at Keith's Theater last week. The smiling faces of the cops will be thrown on the screen at Washington picture houses within the next two weeks.

U. S. PRINTING DEAN, TIMOTHY SHEA, DIES

Timothy Shea, one of the oldest employees of the government printing office, died yesterday morning in Providence Hospital. He was assistant foreman of the bindery. Born in New York August 15, 185, he learned the bookbinding trade and was employed in some of the largest binderies in that city. As an expert in certain lines of the trade, he came to Washington in 1884 and in 1913 he was made an assistant foreman.

In 1915 Mr. Shea represented the Government Printing Office at the Panama-Pacific Exposition and explained the workings of the largest printing plant in the world to thousands of visitors. The funeral will be private with interment in Hudson County, N. J.
