Somewhere in No Man's Land, the ambulance of the Piney Branch Citizens' Association, driven by Maxwell L. Johnston, a Washington boy, is in actual service at the fighting front.

Word was received by the association last night that the ambulance, shipped early in October, with the first unit of the United States Ambulance Corps from Allentown, Pa., had arrived safely in France, and was assigned immediately to service.

POLICE ELEVATION SETS NEW RECORD

Promotions on Force Are Made by Department.

Coincidental with the appointment of James Hartley from a lieutenant to captain of the Ninth precinct to fill the position vacated by the retirement of Capt. Henry Schneider, yesterday came the announcement of the appointment of the first acting captain of police in the history of the department.

Ex-Lieut. James W. Duvall today has the honor of being the first acting captain of police in the District. Sgt. J. W. Pierson, chief of the Vice squad, was promoted to a lieutenant. Sergeant Louis J. Stoll was advanced to the post of acting lieutenant and acting Sgt. Frank S. W. Burke, was given the full rank of sergeant.

REQUIRE AFFIDAVIT BEFORE BUYING COAL

Consumers Obtaining More Than Necessary, It Is Declared.

All purchasers of coal in the District will have to make affidavit giving details of previous purchases before they will be able to obtain any fuel from dealers in the District. These new regulations will probably go into effect within twenty-four hours. This step was decided upon at a meeting of John L. Weaver and his advisory committee yesterday evening.

HURLEY TO HAMMER SHIP'S FIRST RIVET

Chairmen of Board to Officiate at Newark Yards December 17.

The first rivet in the first fabricated steel vessel for the United States Emergency Fleet Corporation will be hammered tight by Chairman Hurley, of the United States Shipping Board, December 17, at Newark, N. J.

The keels of three ships are to be laid as the first of a contract for 150 of them, all of 5,000 tons, to be turned out by midsummer at the rate of one every two or three days. With contracts elsewhere, there will be an aggregate of about 250 of these vessels.

The first to be started will be at the yard of the Submarine Boat Corporation in Newark. The yard in seventy-six days has completed 56 per cent of its equipment for building fabricated, steel ships, including ten shipways and ten miles of yard track.
