**HOUSTON ASKS \$19,730,893 TO AID WAR WORK**

Secretary of Agriculture Seeks to Continue Activity Among Farmers.

To enable the department to continue and extend, during the fiscal year, 1918, the war emergency activities, Secretary Houston has asked Congress for an appropriation of \$19,730,893.

In submitting an estimate for this amount, Secretary Houston explains that while the provisions of the Food Production Act will continue in effect during the existence of a state of war with Germany, the appropriations made by Section 2 of that act are limited to the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918.

"When the regular estimates of the department," the Secretary says, "were under consideration last fall it was decided to make no provision in them for the continuation of the emergency activities under the Food Production Act. It was thought best to defer consideration of this matter until the needs of the next fiscal year could be more accurately determined."

Of the total estimate submitted, it is proposed to use \$5,000,000 for the purchase and sale of seed to farmers for cash at cost, \$1,100,000 for the development of the cooperative agricultural extension work in co-operation with the State agricultural colleges, \$1,269,655 for combating animal diseases, stimulating the production of live stock, and encouraging the conservation and utilization of meat, poultry, dairy and other animal products; \$311,300 for the prevention, control and eradication of insects and plant diseases, and the conservation and utilization of plant products; \$2,868,558 for extending and enlarging the market news service of the Bureau of Markets, preventing the loss of food in storage, in transit, and held for sale, and \$1,030,930 for dealing with the farm-labor problem, enlarging the informational work of the department, printing and distributing the emergency leaflets, posters, and other publications, and extending the work of the Bureau of Entomology and the Bureau of Biological Survey in certain directions.

This appropriation, if granted will supplement the funds included in the regular agricultural appropriation bill which is now pending in the Senate.

**PLEADS GUILTY TO CHARGE OF BIGAMY**

Soldier Charged Also with Desertion and Concealing Weapons.

Private Charles R. Milne, of the Engineer Corps, will probably never get "over there" to fight the Huns. At least, not while this war is going on.

He was arrested Thursday by Police Officer Reith, of the Tenth precinct, on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. Later, an investigation showed, according to Assistant United States Attorney Ralph Given, that Milne was a deserter from an army camp in this city.

Not only was a charge of bigamy placed against him, but Mr. Given charged that Milne had still married to Marion E. Crammond, of Brooklyn, N. Y., deserted his camp and secured a license in February to marry Miss Grace G. Becker, said to be a resident of a street northeast of Washington.

Milne pleaded guilty to the bigamy charge when arraigned yesterday morning, and bond for the grand jury was fixed at \$1,000. He also pleaded guilty to carrying concealed weapons and was fined \$50.

**OPEN-AIR MEETING SCHEDULED BY SUFFS**

**Sammies Learning "Soccer"; Teaching Poilus Football**

How American and French Troops Join in Games and Festivities Told in Letter from Georgetown Graduate.

The French soldiers are rapidly learning the tricks of American football, but they don't go in for all the hard knocks. They are also teaching the American troops in France a new game—soccer—played along lines distinctly different from the game in this country. Proclamations by the mayors of the French villages when Uncle Sam's soldiers arrive attest to the popularity in which the Americans are held in France.

These are the impressive facts in a letter received by Hugh J. Fegan, secretary of the Law School, from Lieut. T. Carroll, Georgetown University graduate, who is flying in France. Lieut. Carroll writes that the French people will go to any inconvenience to make the American troops happy. His letter, in part, is as follows:

"For some time past we have been in this beautiful country and are new quartered with our squadron in a small French town, and in some of the finest villages of the country about 300 years old, although in the most remarkable repair. We are in the most comfortable barracks and are enjoying as good, or better mess than any of us have had since coming in. With the exception of bathing facilities we are finely equipped. Bathing over here, in this particular village, at least, seems to be looked upon as a luxury.

"We are enjoying the finest spring weather under the most beautiful skies imaginable. The thermometer shows that it was foolish for us to expect cold weather in this section. The boys are all fast making the acquaintance of the finest people on earth. It is a hard task to try and understand their language.

"We train awhile, drill some, and some of the boys put on their old, blue fatigue clothes to dig a few ditches and fill a few more and build mess shacks and move field kitchens. Withal, however, we manage to find time to play a game of baseball, or accommodate some French team at soccer, a game which they have been teaching us.

"Last Sunday two of our teams played a game of real American football. It was a corker, a regular Georgetown-Virginia tussle. Both teams had, according to their backers, two or three Petey Walls, a half dozen Gilroy's, and there is one boy here, if you can believe barrack room dope, who even rivals the famous Harry Costello.

"The French like football, but they incline to the 'scientific end' of it. They learn fast but are not so eager as the Americans for the rough work. 'It will seem odd to you, I know, but we had our Christmas dinner one month late. We had a real old American chicken dinner, with songs and speeches, recitations and cheers.
