More Than 100 Ships to Slide Down Ways September 2.

Union labor is asking the co-operation of the U. S. Shipping Board to make Labor Day the record day for ship launchings.

The movement has started on the Pacific Coast and is gathering headway over the country.



BRITAIN PLANS DEMOBILIZING OF HUGE ARMY

Arrangements Are Already Made for Big After-War Task.

London, July 17.—Though no one can foretell how soon the war will end, preparations are already being made to demobilize the vast army when that time does come.

Plans in the war office have been practically completed. Efforts will be made to make the men's last few days in the army as pleasant and comfortable as possible.

The plans so far adopted are as follows. There will be eighteen dispersal stations in the United Kingdom. The companies will be disbanded for the demobilization, as the men will not return as such, but will be transported in groups to the stations nearest their homes.

On their arrival at the dispersal stations, in groups of 500, each man will present his dispersal certificate, given him at the front, and will return his equipment and arms.

AIR SHOW IN PHILADELPHIA. Fleet of Planes Demonstrate War Formation to Citizens.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 17.—Philadelphia today for the first time saw a fleet of war airplanes in full flight over the city.

Seven great biplanes landed at the Bustleton air field station at 9:45 o'clock, after winning their way from Hazelhurst, Field, Mineola, Long Island.

Shortly before noon the fleet appeared over the heart of the city in squadron formation. The roar of the motors was plainly heard in the upper windows of tall buildings.

BOY OF 11 KILLED IN STREET. Harold Burdette, Seeking Ride, Run Over by Wagon.

Fresh Beef Travels on a Rapid Schedule

Fresh beef for domestic markets goes from stockyards to retail stores within a period of about two weeks. Although chilled, this meat is not frozen; hence it cannot be stored for a rise in price.

A steer is dressed usually within twenty-four hours after purchase by the packer. The beef is held in a cooler at the packing house, at a temperature a little above freezing, for about three days.

It is then loaded into a refrigerator car, where a similar temperature is maintained, and is in transit to market on an average of about six days.

Upon arrival at the branch distributing house, it is unloaded into a "cooler", and placed on sale.

Swift & Company requires all beef to be sold during the week of arrival, and the average of sales is within five days. Any delay along the above journey means deterioration in the meat and loss to the packer.
