

JERSEY CARMEN STRIKE SPREADS TO HUNS URGED

Newark, N. J., March 13.—Switchmen and trackmen employed by the Public Service Railway Company today joined the striking carmen of 14 New Jersey towns.

Atlanta, Ga., March 13.—More than 125 railroad clerks quit their posts at the Terminal station, Union Station and uptown city ticket office of the Railroad Administration today.

As an immediate result, the terminal station was seriously affected. The ticket windows were closed for several hours; baggage checking facilities were not available.

Memphis, March 13.—Spreading of the railway clerks strike to the Louisville and Nashville freight depots appears imminent here today as the outcome of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railroad's action in diverting shipments to that line.

Employees on Southeastern railroads who have threatened to quit because of a dispute between railway clerks and their superior officers were yesterday criticized by Director General Hines in a statement issued yesterday.

Flat refusal was the answer of the Navy and War departments yesterday to the request of the Interior Department for the release of the company of New York that was commandeered to supply coal to that concern.

The request was first considered by long distance between Gen. Frank Hines, chief of the Embarkation Service Company, and later in the day, by the Navy Department. The War Department took the ground that the government was not called on to assist this or that company during the pendency of a strike and that, as a matter of fact, the government was not doing its work done very well and without any such delay as would cause it to interfere.

Ask Chairman Hurley and Director Hines for Waterways Policies. Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the Shipping Board, and Walker D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, yesterday were asked by a group of senators and Representatives to outline their future policies with regard to the utilization of interior and coastal waterways for transportation purposes.

The letters to the Shipping Board and the Director General of Railroads were prepared at a conference held at the following participants: Senators Fletcher, of Florida; Ransdell, Louisiana, and Jones, Washington; Representatives Eash, of Wisconsin; Winslow, Massachusetts; Moore, Pennsylvania; Small, North Carolina, and Kennedy, Iowa.

Mr. Hurley was asked particularly for information as to what progress is being made in the construction of towboats and barges for use on the upper Mississippi river, between St. Louis, Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The members of Congress also desired to know what increase in competitive rail and water rates is contemplated in order to effect justice to the water lines, as well as to interior points.

All this information is desired in connection with the preparation of legislation for further development of waterways transportation to be presented to the next Congress.

New York, March 13.—Victor Herbert, noted composer, is planning a new opera based on the romantic escape from Lincoln jail, England, of Edward J. Devine, professor of the Sinn Fein and probably the first president of Ireland if that country succeeds in getting its independence, he said today.

"Here is a beautiful opera plot ready-made," said Herbert. "What could be more romantic than an Irish gardener in the prison yard telling De Valera what to do by singing directions in Gaelic. Then too, there is the additional merit of the beautiful Irish girls who masqueraded as flower sellers about the prison to cozen the English guards. Few great operas have such romantic plots."

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MAN TO MAKE SHERAGE FIGHT

Republican Leader Accepts Chairmanship of Committee on Votes for Women.

The woman suffrage resolution which failed of passage in the last Congress, after having been favorably acted upon by the House, will be reintroduced in the House on the first day of the next session.

This was the statement last night of Representative James R. Mann, of Illinois, who finally agreed to accept the chairmanship of the Woman Suffrage Committee. Mr. Mann said he would ask the Republican caucus to endorse this course, and that he had every reason to believe that his request would be favorably acted upon.

Asked if there would be a two-thirds majority in favor of the resolution in the next House, Mr. Mann said that he believed there would be. "If there should not be," he said, "we will try to establish one."

MOTOR BREAKS ON RADIO SHIP

Lieut. Smith, Forced to Land, Resumes Flight to New York.

The Washington man's name was among those of sixty-four other American medical officers to receive the cross for bravery and distinguished service during the war.
