

12 BIG BATTLES A. E. F.'S RECORD

Major Engagements Designated by Gen. Pershing for Men's Discharges.

American Expeditionary Forces participated in twelve major engagements during the world war. The list, designated by Gen. Pershing and announced yesterday by Gen. March, Chief of Staff, follows:
Somme defensive, March 21-April 6; Lys defensive, April 9-April 27; Aisne offensive (Chemio-des-Dames and northeast of Rheims), May 27-June 5; Montdidier-Noyon defensive, June 9-13; Champagne-Marne defensive, July 18-August 6; Somme offensive, August 8-November 11; Oise-Aisne offensive, August 18-November 11; Ypres-Lys offensive, August 19-November 11; San Mihel offensive, September 15-September 18; Meuse-Argonne offensive, September 26-November 11, and battle of Vittorio-Veneto, Italy, October 21-November 4.
These major engagements are designated by Gen. Pershing to be mentioned in the honorable discharges of the men who participated in them.

Flag of Wilson's Ship Victory Loan Trophy

The flag flown by the George Washington on her voyage to France with President Wilson aboard, will be awarded to the national vessel turning in the biggest Victory Loan subscription. The Navy Department announced last night.
Rear Admiral T. J. Cowie, naval Victory Loan officer, has arranged for the award.
Almost ten million dollars was subscribed to the fourth loan by navy ships—one-fifth of the entire navy's subscription.

JAPANESE CIVILIANS CARRYING WEAPONS

Koreans Informed Sticks Are for Self-Protection of Nipponese.
Seoul, Korea, April 1.—Via Tokyo (United Press).—Foreigners here are showing considerable anxiety because of the nightly presence on the streets of Japanese in civilian garb, some of them in the dress of Koreans, who are carrying heavy sticks and waylaying pedestrians. These Japanese have terrorized the Koreans.
In reply to protests of this nature, officials replied that the police of Seoul have been greatly augmented, but that all wear the regular police uniform. Japanese officials declared that the sticks are being carried by civilians who fear attacks by Koreans.

CROSS OCEAN FLIGHT DEPENDS ON WEATHER

Attempt Will Not Be Made Before May 1.
The date of the Navy transatlantic flight remains to be set, officers in charge of preparations said last night. It will not begin before May 1, they declared. Neither the weather nor the work yet to be done on the planes will permit an earlier start. The actual flight will start from Newfoundland, although the planes will fly up leisurely from Lockaway Beach to the jumping-off point. Some time will be taken at Newfoundland for final tuning up and repairs before the main flight begins.

Realizing more and more the effect of environment on the human brain, the necessity of creating in the home the finer relations between the walls and furnishings to form an harmonious and restful interior has been made plain, and the retail men are accordingly striving toward this goal.

WAR TO BOOST TEACHERS' PAY

Dr. Hanna of Bureau of Education Predicts Permanent Raises.

A permanent boost in teachers' salaries will result from the war, Dr. James R. Hanna, of the Bureau of Education, predicted yesterday.
"One-third of all the teachers in the United States were attracted to other positions, many of them war jobs," said Hanna. "They are returning slowly."
"Yesterday we received sixty-five requests for teachers to fill positions in every part of the country. Friday the number of requests were seventy-seven, Thursday 104. Probably 3,000 calls for teachers will be sent to us this month."
S. H. Registering Everyone.
"We are registering all the teachers we can find who want jobs, but it is a difficult matter to please them. Last September our survey showed a shortage of 50,000 teachers. New and almost untrained teachers numbering 120,000 had been drawn into the school system, but many of them have left. Others are most unsatisfactory."
"The shortage is mostly in country schools and small high schools. In many high schools special subjects, like chemistry, are not being taught, because teachers familiar with this kind of work cannot be obtained."
Although no recent survey of teaching vacancies has been made by the bureau, Dr. Hanna believes the armistice had little effect in relieving the shortage.

30,601 Train for Sea Service.

Since establishment of Merchant Marine Training ships in January, 1918, a total of 30,601 Americans have entered training, the United States Shipping Board announced yesterday.

G. W. U. TO GIVE COURSE FOR YANKS

Re-Education Work Offered Students During Summer Months.

A course on re-education of disabled Yanks will be given at the coming session of the George Washington University Summer School, according to announcement by Dr. William Carl Ruediger, director.
The course will deal with the need, possibilities, methods and results of re-education. It is designed primarily for hospital aids, reconstruction aids and others interested in education for defects. The course will be given in conjunction with the National Service School, 1616 Twentieth street northwest, which will hold its fourth annual championship near Washington June 15 to July 5.
Fifteen lectures will be given, beginning June 15 and closing July 3.
